AN EXTREME VIEW.

The Portland Charter Commission, recently, by a vote of 4 to 20, being absent, declared in favor of the public ownership of public utilities—water works, light plants, street railways etc. This means that the principle of public ownership will be embodied in the new charter and if the people ratify the charter the public ownership idea will become an established fact in Portland.

The Salem Statesman is much vexed over this matter and proceeds to put the brand of its displeasure on the proposition and also to put itself on record as being opposed to the public ownership of anything. "not even of water works, not even of mail cars and mail routes." The Statesman seems to be an extremist in its ardent advocacy of monopolistic control of everything. If all the cities now owning their water and light plants would be benefited by turning them over to a private company why would they not be still more benefited by turning over their streets, sidewalks, bridges etc. to some private toll-taking company? If the national government would gain by turning over the post office department to the express companies why would it not gain still more by turning over its army and navy and light house and life saving service and all other public business to a Morgan-Rockefeller syndicate?

Carried out to its logical conclusion the Statesman's views are a little extreme.

SOCIALISM GROWING.

The following from the Portland Telegram is in line with recent expressions in almost every leading paper in the country. Thinking people cannot help seeing to what the present economic conditions are leading whether it be for war or woe, and many of them are honest enough to tell what they see. "John Buras, the English workingman's friend and representative Parliament, who is called a Socialist, is so only to a limited extent, predicts that America will become socialistic, and hints the effort to become so will result in another great war of this country. This is no wilder or more unreasonable a prediction than one of the war of 1861-5 would have been 20 years before it occurred. Up until the war broke out—may, even after it had been actually raging for months—There were millions of people who refused to believe that such a tremendous tragedy had occurred, or could occur. Men awoke up every morning all over the North and rubbed their eyes thrice before they believed that the great tragedy was not a dream—even though their elder sons' seats were vacant at the breakfast table. Let a plain, blunt statement be made here and now. Causes of a great war are making as surely and rapidly now, if somewhat more under the surface, as they were made from 1820 to 1860. It may not come; we are wiser: we look back on the war of Rebellion and say it was inevitable; no wisdom could have avoided it, and this is true. So very likely, in 1950, the 200,000,000 people of this country will look back on bloodier fields than were ever seen before in the world's history and say: "No it could not be helped." Why? it will be asked. Answer: Because the Government sold and surrendered itself to hogs, cormorants, vampires, gourmands, humbugs, swindlers, rascals, grafters, thieves and robbers. Mind, this is what they will say; will they be right? It is easier to look backward than to look ahead but the wiser

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers.

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what is technically called the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light house-keeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers". The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

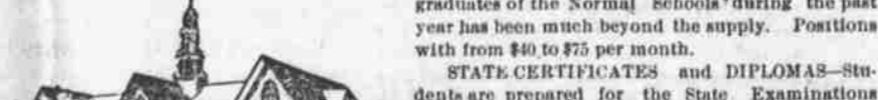
