Between The Dalles and Tunnel No. 3 seven miles of entirely new roadbed will be built which will shorten the line 1000 feet and reduce the maximum curvature from 10 per cent. to 4 per cent. This is perhaps the most important improvement of the year.

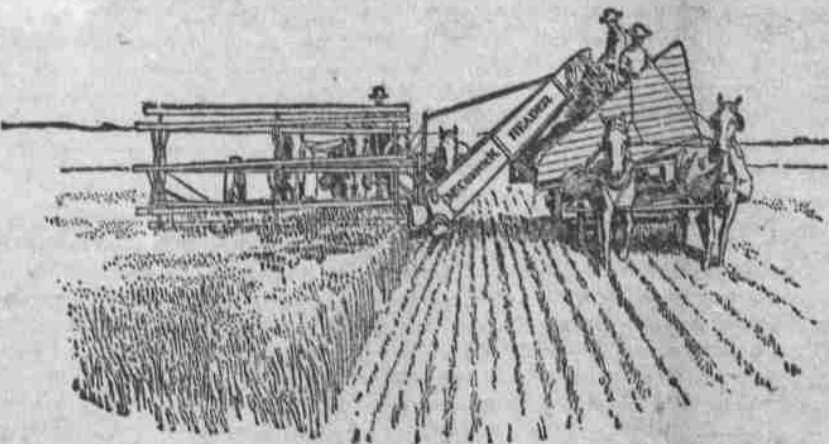
