His physician hopes, however, that, having changed climate he may be able to shake the disease off. If able he is expected to leave for California this week to join Mrs. Curran who is visiting friends in Oakland. He asks to have his copy of the Globe to his Oakland address during his stay there.

Information About Text-Books.

School Superintendent Neal has received a number of copies of the "Text Book Circular," which is issued by the State Board of Education for the information of school officers and patrons in regard to the new school text-books. He will supply every school officer in the county with a copy.
The circular gives a list of the new books with prices of same. From now until December 31, 1901, pupils may make considerable saving on books by exchanging their books on the same subject and of the same grade, thereby getting the benefit of what is known as the "exchange" price. In case they have no old books to exchange they can still effect a saving by purchasing their books before December 31, 1901, thereby securing benefit of what is known as the "introductory" price. After December 31, 1901 old books cannot be exchanged and all persons will be obliged to pay the full retail price for all books purchased.
The saving effected is not uniform but is enough to make an object to all pupils to supply themselves before December 31. As an example of the difference in the scale of prices some books in the list are quoted as follows:
Exchange price, 66 cents; introductory price, 99 cents; retail price, \$1.10.
The books will be on sale at but two places in this county, viz: Condon and Arlington.

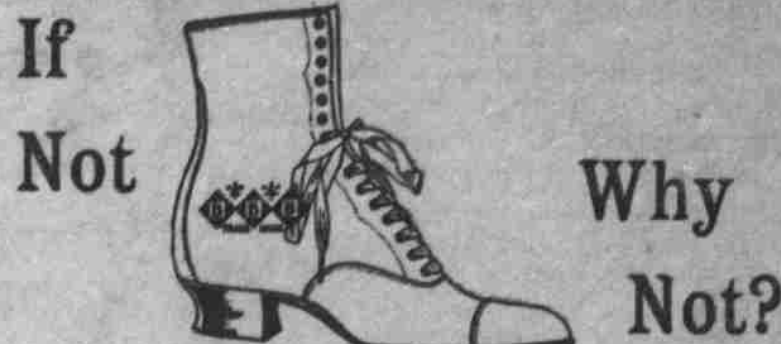
