AN ANARCHISTIC ASSASSIN.

A thrill of horror swept over the country last Friday when the word was flashed all over the land that President McKinley had been struck down by an assassin's bullet at the Pan American Exposition at Buffalo. The assassin claimed to be an anarchist, which term would seem to be synonymous with fool, villain and sneak. It was not William McKinley's life that this monster wanted so much as the life of the President of the United States and no doubt the person of any other citizen who might have occupied that high position would have proven as welcome a mark for his bullet as did Mr. McKinley. The anarchist societies claim that they desire to reform society, to bring about a better condition of affairs among men than those now existing. This they have a perfect right to do so long as they confine themselves to lawful and peaceful methods, but when they organize for deliberate, cold-blooded murder and induce some intellectual weakling or moral degenerate to kill or to destroy, they should be branded as outlaws and hunted to their lairs as ravenous wolves or deadly serpents. Murder, in any form, is a fearful thing but when deliberately planned by an organized body and coolly executed by that body's appointed agent who shows neither fear nor remorse for his crime, it becomes vastly more terrible and dangerous. All citizens of normal moral perception, whether they approve of the policy of the present administration or not, will hope and pray that the president's injuries will not prove fatal and they will just as earnestly desire that steps shall be speedily taken to hunt down these murderous bands of villains that they may be put where the danger of further sneaking assassination will be reduced to the minimum.

Nearly all Americans will devoutly hope that, in the case of the coming yacht race, the Constitution will not follow the flag of Sir Thomas' boat.

William J. Bryan should congratulate himself on the fact that he is live editor rather than a dead president. There is some compensation even in the newspaper business.

The editor of this paper must respectfully but firmly discontinue any attempt on the part of his friends to nominate him for the presidency in 1904. We have very weighty reasons for not wanting to accept the honor.

News comes from Vale, Malheur county, that C. D. Boswell, the newly appointed postmaster is in trouble. Previous to his appointment as postmaster, he served a term as sheriff of the county. Recently the county court ordered a thorough overhauling of the books of the county officers, and it has just transpired that Mr. Boswell's books show a shortage of \$2038. It is understood the shortage will be made good to the county at once.

OUTLOOK PROMISING.

"Will there be a rail road built from Arlington to Condon?" is the question now agitating the minds of the people generally," says the Arlington Record. There is a possibility that there will be no road built but the strong probabilities are that there will be and that work will begin within 60 days and be pushed to completion as fast as men and money can economically do the work. We are quite sure the men who have started this enterprise intend to build the road. It is barely possible that impediments may be put in their way that will delay or hinder them. They are surveying at their own expense and if a suitable grade can be secured and the right-of-way obtained, we are assured the money to build the road is at hand. We learn they have taken an option on a suitable building for offices, and everything indicates that they mean business. They will not ask for a right-of-way until after

the road is built, but want permission from the owners of land to build. They further say their company is independent of any other railroad company and that when the road is built shippers will be free to ship by rail or river, or from Arlington, without being hampered by any one."
