A Crowded School.

School opened Monday morning with over 100 pupils in attendance and to say that the two rooms are crowded but faintly expresses the situation. Not only every desk is taken by young ideas who want to learn "how to shoot," but the recitation benches are also occupied. It is estimated that only about two-thirds of the pupils have yet entered and when the other one-third comes in standing room privileges will go like hot cakes. It has been suggested that a few dozen stout pegs might be fixed in the walls so that a few rows of pupils could be hung up out of the way.

We understand that the trustees are making an effort to secure another room in order that another teacher can be employed to relieve the present congested condition, but whether they will succeed or not cannot be stated at this time. A similar effort made last Fall failed.

Everybody now seems to regret that a new building was not secured during the past summer and some patrons are said to be disposed to lay all the blame of failure on the present school officers.

This is wrong for it may be fairly said that the members of the board have done everything they could do without the united moral support of the patrons and taxpayers behind them, and that they did not have. The truth is that too many of the people of this district take little or no interest in the school. They may be willing to have a good school if it don't cost anything and if someone else will look after the management of it, but they never have the time to attend a school meeting nor the inclination to pat the trustees on the back and say: "Go ahead and build a decent, comfortable, commodious school-house, employ another teacher—or two if necessary—and we will pay for it." They will have to say that, however, if they ever have a school here of which they will have no reason to feel ashamed, for, while the teachers are all right and the pupils are all right—all striving for good results under most unfavorable circumstances, and accomplishing much more than should be reasonably expected of them—still the fact remains that the school could be improved upon, and in school matters, we should all be a bit ashamed of anything short of the best attainable. No boy can do himself justice as a student while hanging from a peg in the wall, and no teacher can do herself or her pupils justice when it becomes necessary for her to study the methods employed by those who pack sardines in tin boxes so she will be able to stow away sixty youngsters in a school room designed for forty.

Whose fault is it? It is the fault of us fellows who furnish the pupils and fail to furnish the proper facilities for educating them; that's whose.
