The Riot Case.

The case to which the most interest attached during the recent term of circuit court was the more or less celebrated "riot case" in which the State of Oregon was plaintiff and half dozen well known residents of Ferry Canyon were defendants. Wm. Bennet, also of Ferry Canyon, was the complaining witness. A number of witnesses were examined on each side and while the evidence showed that some person or persons attacked Bennett, his own was the only direct evidence which tended to connect the defendants with the crime. The defendants, Wm. Mugrove, J. W. Clark, Burns Jones, and Wm. John, and Louis Nelson did not take the stand in their own behalf but had numerous witnesses present to prove an alibi in the case of each one of them. The case was submitted to the jury yesterday afternoon and in 15 minutes they brought in a verdict of "not guilty." District Attorney Menefee, of The Dalles, and Deputy District Attorney Robbins, of Fossil, appeared for the state, and Sam E. Van Vactor, of this place, and H. S. Wilson, of The Dalles, appeared for the defense.
