LOWELL FOR GOVERNOR

Hon. Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton, has announced himself a candidate for the nomination for governor on the Republican ticket. In a letter to the Pendleton Tribune, announcing his candidacy, Mr. Lowell declares himself to be in favor of a mandatory primary election law such as will minimize the power of the political boss and the machine and restore the power to the people. Compulsory arbitration and the assurance to organized labor the same legal recognition and protection as is now accorded organized capital. The adoption of the parole system for youthful offenders as against imprisonment. A board of pardons to consist of the governor and three circuit judges of the state. Increased fees for the creation of incorporations, and fair recompense for valuable public franchises when granted to corporations. He also advocates the re-creation of the state board of equalization, and uniformity of assessment and taxation. Judge Lowell is one of Eastern Oregon's most able citizens and in addition to his marked ability he has the moral courage and independence to have opinions and to express them whether they have been embodied in the confession of faith of his own political party for the last 40 years or not. Oregon has had many worse governors than Judge Lowell would make and it is doubtful if Eastern Oregon will ever be able to name a better, although there is a question whether this end of the State will be permitted to name any one for that office soon.

Two citizens of Condon met the other day. Each had been in California. "What part?" asked one. "Placerville," was the reply. "Yes? well, I used to live there," "When?"

"Forty years ago," "Well, I was there then," "Why, yes; your face seems somewhat familiar. I ought to know you. Wasn't you postmaster there, and editor of a paper? I was there then and had a place mine."

And so these men met, each with silver locks, to tell and remind them of the running of the sands of time. Forty years ago one had a place mine and took out \$9,000 in dust and found a \$1,300 nugget. The other had a fortune in a large fruit orchard and was also postmaster, editor, etc.

Placerville, Eldorado county, was known as "Hangtown" because of vigilance work, and was one of the richest "diggings" in the known world. And these men had met each other for the first time in forty years to talk over the scenes and incidents of the long gone past; world-stirring events that are now stamped indelibly upon the memory of each and upon the pages of history. 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The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers". The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.
