BRYAN'S TRIBUTE.

At the McKinley memorial services held at Lincoln, Nebraska...

"It is not strange that the people bow as one man over the bier of the illustrious fellow-citizen...

PARTIES AND POLITICS.

The following resume of the political parties and the principles upon which they are founded, written by a Kansas man, is reproduced because it appears to tell some truth about all of them.

"Recent events have directed the attention of the people to the subject of what political parties really stand for. The papers for the first time in my memory are trying to define the differences in party creeds. Heretofore parties divided on some specific measure, such as slavery, tariff, gold standard, etc.

"The democratic party claims to stand for the principle that 'the country least governed is best governed,' but that infers that government is a bad thing and logically carrying out that proposition would make no government the best, because it would be the least.

"The republican party stands for government, that it shall be all powerful, but denies that it shall extend its functions to industries, yet itself applies government to some industries, such as postal, school, army, navy, penal and eleemosynary and many other institutions.

"The populist party wants to apply the principle of government to a few things like transportation or banking, but refuses to apply it to all things. It wants government protection of the people from the dominance of a few private interests, but refuses to see that the principle should be applied to all interests.

"The socialist stands out for a full length principle. He wants government, and is willing to follow that demand and to apply it to every activity of life.
