It certainly is a nice cystem. Thread Used in Surgery.

The modern surgeon employs in his work dozens of different kinds of thread for sewing up cuts and wounds. Among them are kangaroo tendons, horsehair, silk and very fine silver wire. Many of these threads are intended to hold for a certain number of days and then naturally break away The short, tough tendons taken from extended one month. the kangaroo, which are used for sewing severe wounds, will hold for about four weeks before they break away. Silk thread will remain much longer, sometimes six months, while the fine silver wire is practically indestructible. With the entire outfit a surgeon is

able to select a thread that will last as long as the wound takes to heal and will then disappear completely. To accommodate this assortment threads special varieties of needles craned in different segments of a cir- can cup. cle, surgeons use needles shaped like spears, javelins and bayonet points. like a miniature knife blade. Others have the sharpened end triangular.
