SHRIVER MADE GUN PLAY.

Money Matters Cause of Trouble.

A shooting affray occurred in the Arlington Saloon last evening about 5 o'clock in which Rundle Palmer received a bad gun shot wound in the face. John Shriver fired the shot from a 38 calibre revolver, which took effect in Palmer's left cheek. The ball followed the jaw bone and came out just back of, and below the left ear making only a severe flesh wound.

The cause of the shooting is hard to arrive at but from the best information at hand the men were engaged in a poker game when Shriver asked Palmer to pay him some money which he claimed Palmer owed him. Palmer evaded the matter and Shriver went for his gun. When he returned he found Palmer standing at the bar and after asking him to pay shot him. Shriver had been drinking heavily all day and was said to have had quite a "jag on" when the shooting occurred.

Shriver was placed under arrest and was held in \$750 bonds for a preliminary hearing at 2 o'clock today.

J. A. McMorris has been busy for a few days putting in new 'phones on the city circuit of his telephone system and also in bringing in the Myers line which now connects the Ferry Canyon country with Condon. This system is perhaps the most extensive barb wire telephone plant in the country and it seems to be giving excellent satisfaction to the patrons. The system now embraces three city circuits with 18 'phones; the Matney Flat line with 11 'phones and the Myers line with 5 'phones. The line is now equipped with a night service by which any patron may call up any doctor's office or drug store in the city at any hour of the day or night. An extra charge of 50 cents will be made for night calls to defray the additional office expense. The office equipment is strictly up-to-date and the entire system affords an excellent service to patrons.
