Semi-Annual Statement.

The semi-annual statement of the financial condition of Gilliam county for the six months ending Sept. 30, 1901, is before us.
 The clerk's statement shows that during the time above named the county court allowed claims to the amount of \$12943.48 for which warrants were drawn. Of this amount \$6371.59 is charged to the road and bridge account, \$303.95 to pauper account, \$50 to criminal account, \$213.90 to jury account and \$1918.00 to coyote bounty account. The remaining \$3381.18 is charged to county officials' salaries and court house and jail expenses.
 The sheriff's statement shows that he has received and paid out \$30893.58 on the general fund and \$6188.72 on the school fund.
 The treasurer's report shows that he has received and paid out \$30893.58 on the general fund and \$6188.72 on the school fund. Of this last amount \$2619.73 is in the hands of the county treasurer, applicable to the payment of county warrants and the remaining \$13450.00 is given as the estimated amount of unpaid taxes.
