Portland Takes Hold.

The board of trustees of the Chamber of Commerce at their regular meeting tomorrow forenoon will take up for consideration the matter of the improvement of the Upper Columbia River. A resolution, now being prepared, will likely be adopted, setting forth the necessity of removing the obstructions to navigation at Celilo Falls, and suggesting that a fixed yearly appropriation be authorized by Congress, so that this proposed improvement may be carried on under the contract system from year to year until the desired result has finally been accomplished. To place the channel permanently in navigable condition will require a total appropriation of about \$4,000,000. Copies of the resolution will be forwarded to all commercial and other influential bodies of the Inland Empire so that the people there may be aroused to concerted action in co-operating with the Chamber here for the purpose of interesting the Congressional delegation at Washington to take the matter up and push it through at the next session. The matter is one of greatest import.—Telegram.
