A FLOURING MILL

Prospects Bright for Securing the Plant.

WILL HELP COMMUNITY

Now is the Time to Secure an Important Enterprise.

Messrs. Marquardsen and Hollen who are here from Oklahoma with a view to putting in a first class flouring mill laid their proposition before the business men of the town Monday and Tuesday and received substantial encouragement to go ahead with the enterprise.

The proposition made by the gentlemen is about as follows: They will erect a first-class, modern flouring mill, having a capacity of 75 barrels per day to cost in the neighborhood of \$14,000. All they ask from the town is a site (which has already been secured by Mr. Lancaster) and the cost of freighting the material and machinery from Arlington and the saw mills. The gentlemen feel that they are justified in asking this much of a bonus for the reason that they have been approached by the citizens of Arlington with a proposition to establish the mill in that town and were they to do so they would avoid the expense of a 40-mile haul of all the heavy machinery and lumber which they estimate will cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000. The proposition seems to be a very liberal one and as Condon has always needed and wanted an enterprise of this kind there should be no delay in closing the matter with these gentlemen and making sure of the plant. Such an enterprise, if established would be of inestimable advantage, not only to the town but to the entire community. Every wheat grower will be benefited as the mill will furnish a market right at home for a large amount of wheat every year and farmers should feel as lively as interest in securing the plant as do the people of the town. Every body should help a little and donations from the farmers in either wheat or hauling freight will be as acceptable as cash.

The mill company are also figuring on putting in an electric light plant in connection with the mill to supply the town with light and will ask the city for a franchise for that purpose. This is a modern improvement that every progressive town needs and now is the time for Condon to take hold and secure it.
