New Enterprise is Now Assured.

BONUS ALMOST RAISED.

Everybody Willing to help.

Condon is to have a first-class flouring mill.

The concern will be known as the Condon Milling Company.

Messrs. Hollen and Marquardsen informed the Globe Tuesday morning that the statement could be made authoritatively that the mill will be built.

As stated last week the gentlemen asked a bonus of \$1,000 to offset the expense of hauling the machinery from the railroad and already about \$700 of that amount has been pledged by citizens of the town. The farmers of the surrounding country are taking a lively interest in the matter and are subscribing liberally, their subscriptions, generally to be paid in hauling freight from Arlington. Subscription papers can be found at Dunn Bros', P. H. Stephenson's and S. B. Barker and there is no doubt but that the required amount will be pledged in a short time.

The building will require about 60,000 feet of lumber, 39,000 shingles, and the machinery will weigh approximately 60,000 pounds.

Bills of the lumber etc. have been made out and are ready to be turned over to the lumber dealers and work will be commenced on the building as soon as possible next spring.

Mr. Marquardsen left for the East Tuesday morning to purchase machinery for the plant. He will return as soon as Spring opens and take charge of the work of construction. Mr. Hollen has rented the Nelson property, on Spring street and will move his family there within a few days. He will buy lots and build a good residence thereon in the Spring.
