It has been a common sight here in Condon, to see boys of tender years carrying rifles—going gunning—often in squads of four or five and the wonder is that some such accident has not occurred before. A gun should not necessarily be an absolute requisite to a boy's happiness and parents would do much to lessen the chances of such tragedies by seeing to it that such dangerous playthings are not numbered among their boy's possessions.

### Recent Deaths.

#### Lamberson.

Samuel Lamberson, an old and respected citizen of Ferry Canyon, died suddenly of heart failure at the home of his son-in-law S. F. Palmer, where he was visiting, Monday, the 25th inst. He rode out in the pasture with Mr. Palmer to help drive in a band of horses when the horse he was riding became fractious and the old gentleman dismounted and said he would lead him to avoid an accident. Mr. Palmer rode on after the horses and in a few moments he saw the horse which Mr. Lamberson had been leading running loose. He at once rode back to look for the old gentleman and found him dead. He had long been troubled with heart disease and the excitement caused by the fractiousness of the horse he was riding perhaps brought on the attack to which he succumbed. Deceased was born in Tuscarawas county, Ohio, October 30, 1831 and was aged 71 years 1 month and 23 days at the time of his death. He was one of the early pioneers of Oregon, having crossed the plains in 1845. He resided in Columbia county for more than 25 years and removed to Eastern Oregon in 1876.

A widow and ten children, seven daughters and three sons, survive him. The children are: Dr. J. A. Lamberson of Lebanon, Marion, of Portland; Timothy of New Mexico; Mrs. Ed Smith of Albany; Mrs. John Beardsley of Sumpter; Mrs. S. F. Palmer, Mrs. S. B. Couture and Mrs. J. F. Storb of Ferry Canyon and Mrs. J. M. Downing and Mrs. J. O. Portwood, of Condon. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon, being conducted by Rev. Brackenberry of Fossil, interment being in Mount Moriah cemetery at this place.

#### Nelson.

DIED—Saturday evening, December 21, 1901, of pneumonia, Edward A. Nelson, aged about 45 years.

Deceased was a native of Pennsylvania having been born in Erie, that state, but in early childhood his parents removed to Iowa where he grew to manhood. He came to Eastern Oregon about 24 years ago, and has been in Condon almost since the town started. He owned the Arlington-Fossil stage line several years ago and was widely known among the traveling public as a first-class stage and liveryman.

His sister Mrs. Mary Spear, and her family, of Fossil, are all the relatives he had in this part of the country.

Mr. Nelson was a member of the Masonic fraternity, the Order of Eastern Star and the Woodmen of the World and his funeral, which took place Sunday afternoon was under the direction of the two orders first named.

His niece Mrs. Noland, of Fossil, came over Sunday to attend the funeral.

### Pullman Ordinary Sleepers

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper."

These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers".

The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
