SHOT THRO' HEART

Charles Rice Loses His Life Sunday Afternoon.

A DEPLORABLE ACCIDENT.

Rifle Accidentally Discharged by Arthur Wilcox, a Boy Companion.

One of the saddest accidents that it has ever been the duty of this paper to chronicle occurred Sunday afternoon at S. S. Grider's place, east of town, when Charlie Rice, the 18-year-old son of Mrs. M. J. Rice, of this place, was almost instantly killed by the accidental discharge of a 22-calibre rifle held by Arthur Wilcox, the 14-year-old son of Sheriff Wilcox.

The boys went out to visit Mr. Grider's son Walter, who had just received a new rifle the day before as a present. After dinner the boys went out on the porch to try the new gun before starting out hunting. Charlie fired a couple of shots at a mark and after firing the last shot he worked the slide which ejects the empty shell and reloads the barrel from the magazine, which operation leaves the gun cocked ready for firing. He then set the gun down leaning it against the wall and said, "Come boys, let's go hunting" and stepped backward a few feet from the porch. Arthur picked up the gun, laying it across his arm, when the weapon was discharged. The ball struck Charlie fair on the left breast penetrating the heart. Mr. and Mrs. Grider were in the house Mrs. Grider being near the door which was open. As the shot rang out Walter said "You have shot Charlie." At this Mrs. Grider turned and looked at Charlie who stood motionless, smiling. Instantly, however, his face paled, he placed his hand over his heart, exclaimed "Oh!" and just as Mrs. Grider reached him he fell. He expired within ten minutes without speaking.

His mother and his two sisters, Mrs. W. M. Dunlap and Mrs. Allie Balding, were almost completely prostrated by the terrible shock as was also Arthur Wilcox who unwittingly discharged the gun.

The funeral took place Monday afternoon the services being held in Armory hall which was crowded. The services were conducted by Elders Chase and Moore of the Latter Day Saint's church and were simple, appropriate and impressive.

Charlie was a pupil in Professor Neal's room of the public school and the pupils of that room and the teachers of the school attended the funeral in a body.

Expressions of deepest sympathy are heard on every hand for the grief-stricken mother, sisters and brother as well as for the boys who were connected with the sad occurrence and their families.

The funeral of E. A. Nelson had just started to the cemetery when the news of Charlie's tragic death reached town and it is a strange coincidence that his funeral was in progress Monday when news of the sudden death of Mr. Lamberson, of Ferry Canyon was received.

Truly this holiday season is a sad and gloomy one in many Condon homes.
