## OPEN THE COLUMBIA.

The following strong open letter has recently been addressed by Hollen Parker, of Walla Walla, to Senators John H. Mitchell, of Oregon, and Geo. Turner, of Washington. It is full of strong facts and should have the hearty endorsement of every resident of the Inland Empire.

To United States Senators John H. Mitchell, George Turner: and to those who are opposed to extortion and oppression:  
Before the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States succeeds in inducing Congress to authorize him and the banks to use at a nominal rate of interest from \$150,000,000 to \$200,000,000 that the people have been compelled to pay, and allow said banks to lend this vast amount of idle money to the same oppressed people for 8 to 10 per cent per annum compound interest, the pioneers and other settlers of this Inland Empire (the best climate, the best land, and the most healthful) as extensive as all the New England States, with New York and Ohio and part of Pennsylvania, wish to know if United States Senator John H. Mitchell, of Oregon, who has always been a true friend of eastern Oregon and Washington, and United States Senator George Turner of the state of Washington, with other friends, will have the federal government, in the year, 1902, build a portage railroad around the dalles of the Columbia at Celilo, about 15 miles in length, for present relief, and until the federal government completes the boat railway and locks, which work has been delayed for nearly a generation. The report of engineers many years ago showed that an amount equal to the yearly loss to the farmers would more than pay to open the Columbia. As long as the Lombard street and the Wall street gamblers, holders of greatly watered stocks of transportation companies, can control a majority of either branch of the legislature, the states of Oregon and Washington will never open the Columbia river nor build said portage railroad. Judging from the vast millions of dollars that the United States government has given to improve the Mississippi river, the Columbia river (the greatest waterway in the United States save one) will be improved just as soon as congress knows the importance of immediate action—as said gamblers and transportation companies cannot control either the United States Senate or lower house.

As a rule I am not in favor of combines or trusts. But in no other way can be devised to secure action let all voters in this Inland Empire organize without fail, do away with all party lines and in the future vote only for such members of congress, members of the legislature and all other officials as will work and vote only with those who will do all that can be speedily done to develop and build up this Inland Empire. Then the best wheat grown will not be kept down in price to 40 cents a bushel, or about one-half the Eastern price, by ship-owners and other transportation companies, wheat buyers and speculators and gamblers. Notwithstanding that during the past few years our largest railroad, if not all railroads, have increased their business more than double and given an order for additional rolling stock before the close of the year at the estimated cost of over \$2,500,000, the United States government interstate commerce commission permits said transportation companies to charge extortionate and oppressive

rates to make large interest upon their watered stock. It has been estimated that said transportation lines could be built for one-fourth the amount of their watered stock. I advocate this measure of opening the Columbia as a half-century pioneer and land owner and wheat grower, as well as to help put a stop to so much extortion and oppression.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers  
The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what is technically called the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but are furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers". The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.  
Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
