Obituary.

After a lingering illness of almost one and one-half years duration C. W. White passed away at 1:45 this morning at the residence of F. H. Stephenson in this city where he was temporarily residing. He had been suffering from diabetes for months and his death was not unexpected.

Charles Wilkinson White was born in Lincolnshire, England in 1858. In June, 1878, when in his 20th year, he emigrated to Lone Rock where he joined his elder brother, William, who had preceded him to the United States, coming directly to Lone Rock where he joined his elder brother, William, who had preceded him to the New World. After stopping for a short time at Lone Rock he settled on Paper Sack where he established a home for his parents and sisters who came on from England and joined him in the autumn of the same year, and that place has been his home since that time.

In partnership with his father Mr. White engaged in the stock business and was eminently successful in that vocation. Years ago the elder White, on account of the infirmities of advancing years, turned over the management of his affairs to his son, who, by his energy and ability and close application to business, built up one of the most valuable estates in the county.

He was married several years ago to Mrs. Nellie Hutchinson who, with his aged father, four sisters and one brother survives him.

Mr. White was one of the best known residents of the county and was held in high esteem as a citizen and as a neighbor and his home was noted far and wide for its open handed, free hearted hospitality. He was the highest Mason in this county, having attained the 32nd, or Shriner's degree in that ancient brotherhood.

The funeral will take place Saturday at the family burying ground on Paper-sack.
