THE MACHINE IN POLITICS.

The Simon machine is running things with a high hand in Multnomah county lately and the indications point to a continued war in the republican party in Oregon. A majority of the county commissioners are Simon heels and when the matter of appointing judges and clerks for the coming primaries came up for consideration they proceeded to scoop the whole works. The Oregonian and Telegram are both plain spoken in denouncing the work of the machine and the decent element of all classes of citizens are up in arms. The work of machine politicians in Oregon is not confined to Multnomah county but permeates the political fabric of every county in the state to a greater or less degree and it is to be hoped that this movement, looking to the overthrow of the machine, which started in Portland, will spread to every county in the state. Every machine man, every ringster, now holding a state or county office no matter what his political affiliations, should be assisted down and out of the political arena at the next election.

J. J. Hill is said to be negotiating for the government transports now plying between San Francisco and the Philippines and as soon as the deal is closed will control and operate that branch of the government service. What's the matter with selling out the whole United States to Uncle Jim and be done with it? It would save trouble to close the matter up in one deal and we might offer to "throw in" the Philippines for good measure.

GOVERNOR McBRIDE VS THE RAILROADS.

Governor McBride, of Washington has declared himself as being strongly opposed to the big railroad trust which is being formed by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific companies under the name of the Northern Securities Company. The governor's statement on this subject is somewhat sensational to say the least and will make interesting reading for the railroad lobbyists and trust promoters. He urges the creation of a State railroad commission, clothed with full power to regulate and control railroad rates in that state and the enlargement of the powers of the inter-state commerce commission to such a degree as to give it absolute power over inter-state rates.

He also declares that the corrupt railroad lobby which has so long dictated legislation at Olympia must be stamped out of existence. On this subject he says:

"If the railroads see fit to charge exorbitant rates, the people are helpless. In the absence of legislation the courts of the state can afford them no relief. Of course it is claimed, in behalf of the managers of these railroads, that they are actuated by the best motives, and that their rule is, in reality, a beneficent rule. But when we reflect upon the methods resorted to through the medium of an insolent and corrupt railroad lobby, to uphold their beneficent sway and to suppress all legislation in the interest of the people, we have a right to distrust these pretensions."

"In my judgment the people of the states should say to the railroads: We will treat you with absolute fairness, but you shall not, through your political Hessians, control con-

VENTIONS AND DOMINATE LEGISLATURE.

We desire not to hamper you in your great enterprise, but you must not, through your hired retainers, subordinate every other interest in the state to your own. The governor fails, however, to tell the people how to go to work to stamp out the lobby and this part of the program will be found no small job. State control of railway rates is a long step toward government ownership of the railroads and it looks more and more as though the railroad magnates themselves are preparing the way for just such a condition in the not distant future.

CRATER LAKE FOREST RESERVE.

An effort is being made to have Crater Lake, which is located at the summit of the Cascade range in Klamath county, Oregon, set apart as a national park. The lake is one of the great natural wonders of the world. It is about six miles in diameter and is nearly surrounded by perpendicular walls from 1,000 to 2,000 feet high. The water is 2,000 feet deep. In the center of the lake is circular island, or cinder cone 845 feet high in the top of which is an extinct crater 90 feet deep. The surrounding country is rugged and of no value for agricultural purposes.

Congressman Tongue has introduced a bill in Congress to have the lake set apart as a national park and a strong effort is being made by lovers of nature to have the same become a law.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers". The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
