GOVERNMENT TELEGRAPH.

President Roosevelt is reported as being an ardent advocate of government ownership of the telegraph.

Without questioning the president's right motive in this matter it may be suggested that the present is not an opportune time for the acquisition of the telegraph lines by the government.

The government has never before been in a hurry to take over the telegraph lines, when a better and cheaper system was unthought of.

THE RAILROAD MERGER.

The Eugene Register favors the consolidation of the trans-continental railway lines on the ground that the combine cannot last.

"We believe if the consolidation was left to stand as it is long enough the result would be the building of one or more additional trans-continental lines to the coast and there would naturally result a competition that would force freight rates down to a more reasonable figure and prove a great blessing to the Pacific coast."

The Register fails to explain what there is to prevent any new lines, which may be built to compete with the Northwestern Securities Co's. lines, from being swallowed up and controlled by that powerful corporation whenever they should come to interfere with its business and profits.

Should new lines of road be built to this coast, more than are needed to handle the trans-continental business to good advantage and even if they should retain their independence and continue to be operated as "competing lines," they would only be an additional burden on the producers and consumers of the country because from their pockets must come, ultimately, the cost of construction, the interest on bonded indebtedness and the operating expenses of every railway.

cause it pays the owners—and because modern conditions demand it, and for them to revert to the old system of competition, which they have thoroughly tried and found wanting, would be a step backward.

The railway merger may be a blessing in disguise but the blessing is more likely to come through the channel of government ownership, as outlined in a recent editorial in the Oregonian, than by the retrograde movement as predicted by the Register.
