The valley is over 7,000 feet above sea level but the climate is comparatively mild. There is plenty of water for irrigation both from streams and artesian wells and wonderful crops are produced. **Killed at Arlington.**  
B. R. Hankins, an old resident of Arlington, was shot and instantly killed by City Marshal T. Sweetin, at that place last Thursday afternoon.  
From the best information obtainable it seems that had blood had existed between the two men for some time and on the evening before the shooting this feeling culminated in an altercation during which Sweetin slapped Hankins in the face. Hankins tried to pull his gun then but the weapon got fast in the pocket and he could not get it quick enough. The next day Hankins was talking to S. A. D. Gurley on the street near the post office regarding the trouble with Sweetin when that officer passed them. Just at that moment Hankins made a remark to which Sweetin took exception and turning on the sidewalk he asked Hankins if that remark was directed to him. Hankins replied that he was not talking to him but was talking about him at the same time drawing his gun. Sweetin walked back past Hankins and entering the post-office stepped to one side of the door and pulled his gun. Hankins followed him, and as he entered the door Sweetin fired the ball entering the left shoulder severing the spine and lodging under the skin on the right side. As Hankins fell his arms went up and his gun was discharged into the ceiling and Sweetin shot him again, through the heart and again in the right shoulder.  
A coroner's jury was empaneled and returned a verdict in accordance with the facts above stated.  
Sweetin was given a preliminary examination Friday and, it appearing from the testimony that he acted in self-defense, the shooting was found justifiable and he was discharged.
