REGISTRATION LAW.

A reliable gentleman of Rock creek precinct informed the GLOBE a few days ago that in his precinct the belief is common among the voters that the registration law compels all voters to appear in person at the office of the county clerk for the purpose of being registered...

No registration is necessary to entitle a voter to take part in the primaries, except in Multnomah county, but all who fail to register as required by law will be obliged to swear their votes in at the June election.

PROGRESSIVE POLITICS.

Under the above caption the Portland Telegram prints a thoughtful editorial in a recent issue in which it points out that the present trend of politics is for the better. It says in part: "Yes, slowly gradually, but surely, we will elevate men to high positions better fit to make a state; men who would scorn to profit a dollar's worth out of their office beyond their legal salaries; men who dare say yes and no and look God and all men in the face; men who do not have to connubiate and play snide tricks and slip around shady corners and through dark alleys—actually or metaphorically—either to get a nomination or to get elected."

You smile, you grater! Well you will see, if you live long enough. We will get rid of some of you this year, perhaps, some more in 1904, and so on. Not that there are not 'good men,' who do their duty fairly well in local public service, but the animating thought running all through, is wrong, injurious, vicious dangerous. It is: Get as much out of the public as possible, and do as little as possible for the public. That is the basic principle of officialdom—with some exceptions, of course—everywhere. Now that is going to be changed. The public is going to pay a man a fair salary for his services, and demand a fair, square day's work, every necessary working day in the year; and if he wants a re-election he will get it on his record, on his merits, not by neglecting his duties to run down to the "North End" or out to this or that club, to tell the voters how the country must be saved. The politics of the future will have less "board" and more manhood, less "bottle" and more conscience, less graft and more grit. The primary law will carry us forward a little.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper". These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers". The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Each of these first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
