THE MACHINE BEATEN.

The Simon machine was badly smashed in Multnomah county last Saturday and it begins to look as though the beginning of the end has come for the little, big political boss.

The independent republicans of Multnomah county are to be congratulated. They have tired of being owned and controlled by a political ring and have shown their resentment in no uncertain way.

The people of Oregon as a class are showing marked symptoms of being infected with the anti-ring germ and the disease is becoming so general in all the counties that the old political bosses are beginning to feel their grip loosen and the end of their political career near at hand. Let the good work go on. Let the people of Oregon arise in their might and smash the machine no matter of what party or of both parties. Let the people rule. Don't be "content to be governed."

A COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL.

The county court, at its last session, passed an order submitting the question of building a county high school in this county to the voters at the next June election for their approval or rejection.

This question is an important one to all the people of the county and there should be no question as to its adoption.

The county needs a high school and there is only one way to get it and that is to vote for it. Under present conditions every pupil who would advance beyond the eighth grade must, at a heavy expense, go outside of the county and it is only a business proposition to establish a high school in the county and keep such pupils, and the money they spend elsewhere, at home. Every friend of education should interest himself in the high school matter and make a personal effort to have the question voted favorably upon at the election next June.

POLITICAL INDEPENDENCE.

More than a grain of truth may be found in the following from the Salem Weekly Review:

"The going back of Hon. H. G. Guild to the Republican party is a matter many of his former political brethren marvel at greatly. To the writer it is but a proof that party lines are rapidly fading away among people who can reason and think outside of their own welfare. To say that Mr. Guild believes in and adheres to the policies and principles fraudulently set forth under the name of the Republican party, would be as great a mistake as to say he favored similar things done by the Democratic party. Guild is honest. He wants to find the party that is right. It is a hard job. They are all right but to say which is the nearest so, would be unjust to the rest. If honestly stepping from one political party into another was the greatest inconsistency a man was capable of we would have a pretty fair old world."

The man who goes from one political party to another is too often stigmatized as a "fopper" and a "turncoat" by blind partisanship when he should be respected as an honest seeker after truth. The earnest, honest thoughtful man will try to seek a party whose principles come nearest to his idea of what is right rather than try to bend and warp his convictions to conform to the dictations of any party. What the country needs at this time, more than all things else, is less blind partisanship and more intelligent independent political thought and action. More patriots if you please and fewer political bosses.

Political Points.

Hon. J. N. Williamson, of Prineville, who is a promising aspirant for the republican nomination for congress was in town for a few days last week looking after his interests in the campaign. Mr. Williamson is at present a member of the State senate and is known as the father of the scalp bounty law.

The republican primaries will be held next Saturday and there promises to be a warm contest between the Moody and Williamson factions. In county affairs but little can be learned as to the intention of the leaders in naming a county ticket farther than that it seems to be conceded that C. O. Portwood will be given the nomination for clerk. Judge Mariner is reported to have announced himself a candidate for re-nomination for County Judge and George Tatum is also spoken of for that nomination.

C. A. Danneman, Mike Duke, R. M. Johnson and Frank Wilson have been mentioned as possible candidates for sheriff on the republican ticket but if any one knows who will get it they are keeping their knowledge to themselves.

The same uncertainty seems to exist in regard to the nomination for county treasurer in the republican camp. E. W. Moore, F. M. Pitter, J. F. Reischer and Al Henshaw have each been mentioned in connection with that nomination but it is impossible to tell who will be successful. R. H. Wain is mentioned for the surveyor's office.

The situation is quite as hard to fathom in the democratic camp as in the republican. B. K. Searcy is prominently mentioned as the next democratic candidate for sheriff and his name seems to meet with general approval. T. G. Johnson is also mentioned for that nomination.

W. L. Wilcox is understood to be a candidate for the nomination for clerk and Tom Malanophy of Olex and Jack Shelton, of Arlington, have also been mentioned in that connection. Mr. Shelton has also been mentioned for the assessor's place and Ray Rogers, of Ferry Canyon has also been brought forward by numerous friends for that nomination.

P. H. Stephenson is spoken of as likely to succeed himself to the nomination for county treasurer and L. W. Darling is also thought to be a good man to succeed himself as county surveyor. He has also been spoken of as a possible candidate for county judge. Ed Dunn is also being urged for the judgeship by many democrats and W. J. Edwards, of Mayville, is also spoken of.

So far as the Globe can learn both parties seem to be in the dark as to who will come up for county commissioners, two of whom are to be elected, farther than that J. B. Goff, of Lone Rock, is prominently mentioned for that place on the republican ticket.

Dr. Reedy, of Arlington, is spoken of as the republican candidate for coroner, and Dr. Lazier, of Arlington, and Dr. Wood, of Condon, are mentioned for that place by the democrats.

The right thing for the members of both parties to do is to attend their respective primaries and send up delegates to the conventions who will nominate non-partisan good men to fill these offices. The rank and file should realize that they are the people and should adopt as their motto "no ringsters need apply."

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers". The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.
