A DANGEROUS MEASURE.

The bill which has passed the senate for the protection of the president is so radical that it is easy to understand why there should have been a determined and reasonable opposition to its enactment in a law.

There can be no objection to the death penalty for any person who shall wilfully and maliciously kill the president or an official who is in the line of succession; but a great many people will agree that the senate, actuated no doubt by a sense of horror at the recent assassination, is going to extremes when it provides that any person making only an attempt to kill the persons named shall suffer death.

The bill just passed is so sweeping as to include every possible assailant of every person who is president or in the line of succession, and it makes no distinction as to cause or character of the assault. It matters not whether the motives of the deed are political or private.

Thus under the proposed law, if some cabinet officer of offensive character or disposition became involved in a personal or private quarrel which resulted in his being wilfully and maliciously attacked without fatal results; or if he were assailed by some erratic individual who labored under the impression that he had a grievance to settle; or if he compromised himself in a way that often results in bloodshed the assailant in all these cases might be made to suffer the death penalty, when under ordinary circumstances there would probably be acquittal or light imprisonment.

The people want their officials protected, but it should be done by a law that is not so sweeping or so likely to work injustice through excessive penalties. No assassin of a president has yet been able to escape merited punishment, and no law, no matter how strict it may be will insure safety for head of state or high official against anarchists who may seek to assault the government through these public servants.—Spokesman's Review.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers
The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what is technically called the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper". These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light housekeeping", and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers". The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger. Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
