A COMPARISON.

The semi-annual report of the financial condition of Gilliam county for the six months ending March 30, 1891, shows the resources of the county to be \$23,380.11 and the liabilities to be \$12,819.62.

The tax levy for county purposes made at the meeting of the county commissioners' court in January 1892 was 12 mills.

The semi-annual report of the financial condition of Gilliam county for the six months ending Sept. 30, 1901, shows the resources of the county to be \$19,060.73 and the liabilities to be \$33,215.32.

At that time, had Gilliam county been called upon to liquidate, she would have found herself short to the amount of \$14,157.59.

The tax levy for county purposes made at the meeting of the county commissioners' court in January, was 20 mills.

Ten years ago Gilliam county was a country of magnificent distances and sparse population. Today it is about one-third smaller in area and its development, in density of population and wealth, has been great.

These facts should furnish some food for reflection to the voters and tax payers of the county between now and the second day of June.

The fight for the governorship between Hon. W. J. Furnish and Hon. George E. Chamberlain promises to be a hot one and the general opinion on the outside among traveling men, railroad men and others who keep in touch with public sentiment seems to indicate that Chamberlain has a big chance of election in spite of the fact that Oregon is strongly republican.

VOTE FOR THE AMENDMENT

Every voter who believes in the principle of government by the people should support the initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution at the coming election. If you are in favor of the amendment you must be sure and vote for it as it is not enough that you do not vote against it.

Therefore work is necessary. Every friend of the amendment, every man in favor of this reform, ought to work for it, from now on, and especially work to get out the votes friendly to it, and see that all voters friendly to it say 'yes' and not ignore it, as many voters ordinarily do.

There has so far been a disposition to vote down all amendments. But this is a different proposition. It is coming—a greater degree of direct legislation—throughout the country. Let Oregon lead the way. It will be a big feather in Oregon's cap.

Both Republicans and Democrats have gone on record as favoring the reform. They have declared for it, professed their belief in it; now let them keep their word throughout the campaign and at the polls and it will win.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP.

Chicago is a big city and its people are progressive in more ways than building sky scrapers and cornering the wheat and hog market. At a recent city election held there 170,000 voters expressed their selves on the public ownership of public utilities and the result was somewhat astonishing.

For public ownership of all electric light, heat and power plants and gas works to furnish light, heat and power for public and private use, 139,999 voted yes and only 21,367 voted no.

For the nomination of all candidates for city offices by a direct vote of the people at primary elections, 140,860 voted yes and only 17,654 voted no.

These figures show that "the world do move." It is only a few years ago that the populist party adopted its first platform which was the first public endorsement of these principles and the politicians poked all kinds of fun at the long whiskered pops.

Now the country may expect to see these same politicians hasten to endorse and advocate public ownership because the Chicago election is a big straw which shows that the wind of public sentiment is blowing that way so strongly that the politicians cannot go against it.

All of which serves to remind us that all reform and all real progress for the human race must come from the people and not from the politicians. All professional politicians, great or small, are enemies of reform and progress in public affairs for the reason that the more public affairs there is in the administration of such affairs for the politicians.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making tea and coffee and doing "light house-keeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths; keep the car clean, and look after the wants and comforts of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.

Each of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
