That is a pretty broad challenge for a modern politician to make unless he knows his position to be absolutely unassailable and if Chamberlain is not "called" it will tend to materially strengthen his position with the people. The people are getting weary of political grafters and the man who can boldly make such an assertion and not be proven a bluffer by his opponents will prove a hard man to beat even if his party is in the minority.

**THE PORTAGE ROAD.**  
Portland at last seems to be taking an interest in the portage road at Celilo and the indications are favorable to its early completion. Walla Walla and Lewiston capitalists are interested in the project and their plan is to take over the interests of Paul Mohr in the present property and give him stock in the new company to the value of his present holdings. It is claimed that the road can easily be put in operation within four months and that freight rates will be reduced from 25 to 50 per cent. If carried out this project will mean much for Eastern Oregon and it will no doubt be the means of hurrying rail communication between Condon and the Columbia river.

**LOWELL VS. FURNISH.**  
Hon. Stephen A. Lowell is being roasted for his recent letter pledging his support to Chamberlain the democratic nominee for governor. Judge Lowell is a life long republican and was a prominent aspirant for the nomination which Mr. Furnish landed, and this fact is taken as a text by many partisan writers and spouters who are busy just now villifying Lowell as a silly show head and a traitor to his party. ## Semi-Annual Statement.

The semi-annual statement of the financial condition of Gilliam county for the six months ending March 31, 1902, has just been made public.

The county clerk's statement shows that during the time above named the county court allowed claims to the amount of \$10021.08 for which warrants were drawn. Of this amount \$3826.42 is charged to the road and bridge account; \$307.60 to pauper account; \$446.30 to criminal account circuit court; \$232.75 criminal account, justice court; \$531.77 to book stationery and printing account; \$183.64 to court house and jail account; insane account, \$26.45; jury account, \$302.50; fuel account \$125.00 election account, \$10.00; coyote bounty account \$806.00; rebate tax account, \$17.20, and to county officials salary account, \$3,115.45.

The sheriff's statement shows that that official has received as taxes and turned over to the county treasurer \$26,033.85.

The treasurer's report shows that he had of the general fund a balance on hand from last report of \$11,001.15; received from taxes \$26,033.85; and as fees from various sources, \$1,323.43. Of this amount he has redeemed county warrants, \$4,791.66; triplicate receipts, \$8,237.78; interest state tax, rebates etc. \$8,225.20, leaving a balance on hand of \$10,025.87. Of the school fund there was on hand from last report \$4,865.06; taxes received \$4,621.18 making a total of \$9,486.24. School warrants have been redeemed to the amount of \$4,791.66 leaving a balance on hand of \$4,694.58.

The summary statement gives the total liabilities of the county at \$33,025.12 and the resources at \$24,775.00. Of this amount, the funds in the hands of the county treasurer, applicable to the payment of county warrants is given as \$5,331.00 and the estimated amount of unpaid taxes is given as \$19,444.00.

**Pullman Ordinary Sleepers**  
The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." The car attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special" goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.
