School Bond Election.

The election held Tuesday for the purpose of voting bonds on this school district to create a fund for the building of a new school house was fairly well attended and resulted in a sweeping victory for the cause of progress in school affairs. Forty-seven votes were cast of which 46 were "yes." The negative vote was cast by a man who afterward stated that he did not understand the proposition or he would have voted affirmatively. This result is encouraging and if no unforeseen difficulties arise Condon will within a few months have a school building more in keeping with her needs.

There is considerable red tape connected with the sale of bonds, however, and the school board should not lose a moment in pushing the business forward.
