MARINER'S "FIGGERS"

The big array of tabulated "figgers" from Judge Mariner's pen, published in a recent issue of the Arlington Record as a defense or extenuation of the judge's county financial policy, is as confusing to the average mind as it was doubtful as intended to be. After a careful reading of the statement this writer has to confess that he has gained no information of importance in its bearing on the issues of the present campaign which has not already been set forth in the GLOBE. The only question which has been raised, in this connection is whether the county is in good financial condition today after 12 years of the Judge's management of county finances. The tabulated statement and the large mass of other unimportant deductions which appear to have been incorporated in the judge's statement for the purpose of confusing the voters and covering the real issues may be passed over. The judge quotes correctly from the last semi-annual statement when he says that the total liabilities of the county are \$33,025.12 and the total resources \$24,775.00 but when he farther says "leaving net liabilities of \$8,250.12 an amount a little larger than the State tax of \$8,004 which has been paid from current collections recently," he seems to be by inference, attempting to create a false impression. Does he mean to infer that if it had not been for having to pay the state tax the county would be within \$246.12 of being out of debt? What fine financial condition the county would be in, even under Judge Mariner's management, if we did not have to pay any taxes. The real point at issue—which, by the way, the judge ignores entirely—is this: *The county is paying interest on \$31,025.12 in outstanding county warrants so that in reality, the actual county debt.*

Resources in the shape of uncollected taxes are dead resources and should not be considered in this connection until they are collected and turned in to the county treasury.

The judge also says: "It does not take any careful financing to get a county entirely out of debt."

Does he mean by that that it does take "careful financing" to pile up a debt of \$33,000 on a little county like Gilliam, with nothing in the world to show for it but some half made roads.

Perhaps it also requires "careful financing" to allow almost \$20,000 delinquent taxes to pile up without any effort being made to collect them. If so Judge Mariner and Sheriff Wilcox have proven themselves howling successes as "careful financiers." It will be noticed that the judge is as careful not to say a word that will reflect on Mr. Wilcox in the matter as he is not to say anything that will reflect on Mr. Mariner. Why is that do you ask? The answer is not far to seek. That is simply an effect of ring politics and one of the methods of ring politicians. Nothing else.

**COUNTY POLITICS.**

The following from the Portland Evening Journal contains a broad hint for every voter in every county in Oregon:

The duty of the elector is to purify his local government, place in public position men who will employ business methods in the management of public affairs, and will not forever look upon public office as a private snop.

Especially should the methods of business men prevail at the court house of this county.

There should be no politics in these positions.

The professional politician and the grafter may be found in every political party on earth and they very often control the party machinery to such an extent as to secure their own nomination year after year. It remains for the voters to say whether their election is to follow. Is it the part of wisdom for the voters of any party to stay so closely within party lines in local politics as to continue in office, year after year men who have learned through long usage to look upon "public office as a private snop?" By all means no. The intelligent voter will scan the lists of nominees on both tickets with a critical eye and will select as his choice the men whom he honestly believes will give the county the best service and the most modern, intelligent and honestly administered government. The man who demands an office as a sort of a divine right or connivance and schemes to hold a stall at the public crib is a mighty good man to leave at home. Such men may possess wonderful capabilities for success in private life. Who knows?

**BULLDOZING AND FALSEHOOD.**

Mr. Wilcox and his friends have made no attempt to publicly deny the statement made in this paper last week relative to his neglect of duty in the matter of collecting taxes. He has made no attempt to justify his official record as sheriff. He has, instead, resorted to a campaign of bulldozing and falsehood directed against the editor of this paper. He has threatened to ruin the GLOBE financially and has stated that our charge against his official record would not hurt him if he could "get to see the people and explain the matter." The explanation he and his friends offer is that Pattison is opposing him because Pattison wanted the nomination for county clerk. In circulating this story Mr. Wilcox and his henchmen are simply circulating a point blank lie. Every delegate in the last democratic county convention knows that Pattison's name was not before the convention or caucus for any nomination and every democrat who discussed the question of nominations with Pattison knows that he stated, on all occasions, when the question came up, that he was not an aspirant for and would not accept under any circumstances any nomination. We challenge Mr. Wilcox to produce a single democrat who will state that Pattison in any way sought the nomination for clerk or any other place on the ticket.

The statement is also being made to democrats that Pattison has gone over to the republicans because he is opposing Mr. Wilcox. In the name of God does Wilcox constitute the entire democratic party in Gilliam county? Can an honest democrat oppose his election without being read out of the party? Is he a god that we must fall down and worship him? Personally we opposed his nomination because of his official and political record. Because we believed that in the past he has prostituted his office in the interest of his future political ambitions and because we believed that he has, when the occasion arose, sacrificed the entire ticket to increase his own majorities. We are now opposing his election by showing up his official record because we believe it is the plain duty of a newspaper to give such facts to the people in order that they may vote intelligently. If, after being placed in possession of these facts and in view of Mr. Wilcox's utter failure to clear up his official record, the people next Monday see fit to elect him the GLOBE will not complain. It will have done its duty in the interest of good county government and is willing to abide by the consequences. If a majority of the people want to perpetuate a political boss the GLOBE can stand it as long as they can.

Mr. Wilcox has had ample time to reply and clear his record, if such a thing were possible, and knew these columns were open to him. He has failed to do so and the inference is that he has no legitimate defense.

Will the Record tell us why that delinquent tax list which was ordered published has not yet been published? Is it being held back for political reasons or is the Record too busy boosting Mariner and Wilcox to put it in type?

W. L. Wilcox made the statement prior to the convention that he would positively not be a candidate for clerk if any other democrat in the county aspired to that nomination. J. H. Downing, a pioneer democrat, announced himself as an aspirant a day or so before the convention. Did Wilcox stay with his word and yield to Mr. Downing? Not by a jug fall.

For 12 years Mr. Wilcox has been unanimously nominated by the democratic party. For 12 years he has received practically the solid support of that party at the polls. During the past four years his regular deputy has been a republican. His special deputies have also been republicans with one or perhaps two exceptions. Now boys—you democrats who have nominated and boosted and shouted for and voted for this man during all these years—how do you like it? Just be honest with yourselves now. Is this nice political treatment to you? Does such treatment indicate that Mr. Wilcox thinks that his democratic supporters have not intelligence enough to serve a summons, make an arrest or help take an insane person to the asylum or does he ignore you because he thinks he has a cinch on your votes anyhow and wants to hold the reputations in line?

The GLOBE is opposing the election of Mr. Wilcox to the office of county clerk with all its power because it believes that such a course is for the best interests of the taxpayers of Gilliam county. In thus opposing him it was our intention to deal only with his official acts as recorded in the official reports of the various county officers and it is with regret that we have learned things, from trustworthy sources, which seem to indicate that he is not willing to meet the issue squarely on his record as sheriff and stand behind and defend that record, but that he has seen fit to indulge in personal vindictive and dire threats against the GLOBE and the future financial well being of its editor. Personally we care nothing about these little diversions and only call attention to them in order to point out that in making them Mr. Wilcox tacitly admits that he is unable to meet and answer, openly and above board the charge that he has been derelict in his duty as sheriff in failing to collect the taxes, as required by law, and as he is bound by his oath of office to do.

Shortly after Mr. Wilcox was nominated he approached the editor of this paper and requested its support. He was told that under no circumstances could the GLOBE support his candidacy at this time and some of the reasons for our position on the matter were given. At the same time he was assured of our intention of according him absolutely fair treatment in the campaign and that space in the GLOBE would be at his service at any time himself or any of his friends desired to use it in his interest the only condition imposed being the general one that articles of that character must appear over the signature of the writer. If Mr. Wilcox or his friends can honestly take exception to that sort of a proposition then they must stand on the ground that the editor of the GLOBE has not the right, which they claim for themselves, viz: To honestly oppose or support any candidate for any public office within the gift of the people, and if they assume that position they know they are espousing a cause, which followed to its logical conclusion would certainly lead to political corruption terrible to contemplate and finally to the overthrow of republican institutions. The only question to be settled at this time is that of the best interests of the people. Is Mr. Wilcox the best man for the place? Does his official record as sheriff commend him as worthy of further favors from the people? If he has been derelict in his duty as sheriff will he be faithful in his duty as clerk? The GLOBE brought out this matter in ample time for Mr. Wilcox to meet it squarely and manfully and open and above board in the same public manner in which the charge was made. He has failed to do so and the only inference is that he has no defense.

**Pullman Ordinary Sleepers**

The tourist travel between the East and the Pacific Coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleepers being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger.
