No one in any way interested in a liquor license is eligible to public office and every distillery has a government chemist to insure the purity of the product.

The initiative and referendum amendment to the constitution carried at the recent election by an overwhelming majority. This is the first of many proposed amendments to the constitution that has received the sanction of the people and the further fact that the proposition was first agitated by the "wild eyed" "long haired" "crazy" populists and was laughed to scorn means anything but a vindication of the people of Oregon have awakened to the fact that the functions of government have been slipping away from them and have been absorbed by a few politicians and schemers and they have made up their minds to take a hand in the government themselves.
