Willis Robinson, youngest son of R. G. Robinson, of Lone Rock, came to town Tuesday with a broken arm. Dr. Wood reduced the fracture and the boy is getting along nicely.

The school trustees have employed as teachers for the coming year the following persons: Prof. W. R. Neal, principal; Miss Belle Wilson intermediate; Miss Joyce Herschner, primary.

Paul Uibterwood, the alleged murderer of his three-week-old child, has been arrested near South Bend, Washington. He admits giving the child chloroform and then throwing it in the Sound and implicates his wife as being an accessory.

J. M. Cameron sold his wool in Arlington last week at 12 cents for undipped and 9 1/2 for dipped wool. Mr. Cameron will leave shortly for the mountains to look after his sheep on the summer range.

The first brick for Dunn Bros.' new store were mortared at Armstrong's yard Friday. It is expected that all the brick will be mortared and in the kiln in about four weeks ready for the fire. The kiln will contain 150,000.

The city council has ordered a new 2 1/2 h. p. gasoline engine to use for pumping at the city wells. It is expected to arrive in a few days and will at once be put in place and started to work. The council also expects to sink another well at an early date to increase the water supply.

A bid has been received by the school clerk from an eastern firm for the purchase of bonds on this district to the amount of \$3,500 at a premium of about 400, the bonds to bear six per cent interest. The bid will be accepted and the new school house may be considered an assured fact.

Geo. Schott met with a painful accident in town Monday. He was untwining his saddle horse from the rack at T. G. Johnson's house when the animal reared and struck Mr. Schott on the lower lip cutting a gash through the lip. He was rendered unconscious for a while but was all right again the next morning.

D. W. Ralston received word yesterday morning of the death of his son-in-law, Bogart, which occurred at Sheridan, Oregon, Tuesday. Mr. Bogart was an express messenger for the Wells, Fargo Co. on the S. P. road and was accidentally killed by the train. He had been married about a year. Mr. Ralston left at once for Sheridan to attend the funeral.

Earl Palmer met with a painful accident Thursday while driving the horse power at the city well. His right heel was caught in the cog of the power and badly lacerated. Fortunately the horse was a gentle one and stopped when the boy spoke to him, otherwise he might have been crippled for life. Frank Armstrong heard him and assisted him to Dr. Wood's office where five stitches were taken in the wound to close it.

School Election.

There was a good attendance at the annual school meeting held Monday and considerable interest was manifested in school matters. Ed Dunn was elected trustee to succeed F. M. Pitter and Dr. J. F. Wood was elected clerk to succeed L. H. Stephenson.

P. H. Stephenson, S. B. Barker and F. M. Springston were appointed a committee to circulate a petition asking the county court to locate the county high school at Condon. It is understood that Lone Rock and Arlington will also be in the field as aspirants for the high school.

The Chase Abandoned.

The chase after the two murderer convicts, who escaped from the state prison at Salem Monday of last week after killing three guards and wounding a convict, was abandoned Saturday after almost a week's futile search for the fugitives by two or three sheriff's posse and two companies of state militiamen. According to the newspaper reports the search, which was conducted largely in buggies and other comfortable vehicles, was something of a farce. It is probable that three or four determined men who had some knowledge of woodcraft and knew how to handle a gun could have brought in the desperadoes within 48 hours. Men who go out after criminals of this stripe should understand that there is an element of danger involved and should be willing to take their chances. If they feel that they have not the nerve and skill with firearms to give them an equal show with the outlaws they should stay at home. The incident has furnished material for plenty of scare head lines in the city papers for a few days and has been the means of getting the pictures of a lot of the pursuing party in the papers who otherwise might have lived and died unknown to fame. Otherwise the chase has been fruitless. The murderers are still at large and will double a confining their criminal career until they are picked up by some ordinary city policeman or clodhopping constable in one of the back wood precincts.

The chase so far seems to have been mostly for effect. If the things are ever taken it will likely be done by men who will, in the discharge of duty, quietly proceed to take them dead or alive, knowing full well they are taking some chances of losing their own lives in the attempt.

LATER—The convicts have reappeared and the chase has been resumed. The men stole a team and buggy Saturday night in which they rode to one of the suburbs of Portland where they abandoned the vehicle. They are said to have rode through Portland Sunday about noon in a street car. They next appeared on the south bank of the Columbia river nearly opposite Vancouver where they forced three men to set them across the river in a skiff. They then took to the brush on the Washington side and at last accounts have not been apprehended. A large posse has been after them and two of the posse engaged them in a gun fight Monday night the only result being a bullet hole through the clothing of one of the pursuers and three gunshot wounds in the horse they were driving. One of the pursuing party was shot by three others of the posse who mistook him and his companion for the convicts. It is thought he will lose his leg as a result of the wound.
