

It is reported that a Spanish inventor has discovered a method by which he is enabled to draw electricity directly from the air, without any intermediate motive power being used, and applying it directly in driving machinery. If this be true, (and it has been predicted by eminent electricians for several months) it will cause a much greater revolution in the industrial world than the discovery of steam or the present applied forms of electric power. Truly this old world is moving at a rapid pace these days.

The senate last week adopted the Spooner amendment to the isthmian canal bill thereby approving the Panama route. It is significant that most of the senators who have been opposed to any isthmian canal voted for the Panama route without any protest which would seem to indicate that they figure as did Senator Mitchell that the most effective way to fight the canal would be by supporting the Spooner amendment. If the Panama canal is ever completed it will be at the cost of hundreds of thousands of American lives for that climate is known to be deadly to men raised in a more temperate latitude. It has often been said that the Panama railroad cost in its building a human life for every cross-tie in its entire length and while this statement is perhaps exaggerated it is known that the mortality rate was something terrible.

A billion dollar meat trust is now projected and, reports say, will no doubt be consummated. The new concern will not only monopolize the packing house and fresh meat business of the country but will also proceed to take over the cattle raising industry. In other words it will control both ends of the business. Perhaps the monopolization of no other branch of industry will do so much to bring about a big overturning of things generally in these United States than will that of the meat business. All classes of Americans have been accustomed to beef steak too long to submit tamely to having it taken away, and the announcement has already been made that under the new regime it will only be a short time until the price of steak will be entirely beyond the reach of the working classes.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Co. has issued an order prohibiting kissing on its depot platforms and trains on the ground that it interferes with traffic. It is a pretty sure thing that if the order is not speedily rescinded the company will lose the patronage of many people. However it is not wise to ignore the inevitable. It is not wise to make the wish the father of the thought. There be certain facts that stare people in the face. They force themselves upon our observation. They compel attention.

The day of individual enterprise has passed. The day of small shops has gone. The times when men ran corner groceries is become a part of history. Nowadays, we have department stores, great systems of railroads, combinations, trusts and a few gigantic organizations that control what the people use and produce. Imagine the puerility of him who might attempt to stem such a tide.

We may as well agree to acknowledge the truth, then proceed to adjust things social and industrial and political to it. We must face what must be. We shall not accept socialism as forced upon us. We shall resist it to what extent is possible. We shall try to avoid what seems to us now approaching social shoals. But we shall be honest. We shall apply ourselves to the problems of the day in a spirit of proper concession of obvious truth. What shall be the outcome no man can now say. But every one should know that individualism as it once was is no more; that centralization has absorbed the energies of the times, and society must adjust itself to the new conditions.—Portland Journal.
