Grant & Co.'s new mail stages went on the route Tuesday morning and Condon now has two first-class stage lines.

Mrs. C. W. White sold her wool in Heppner last week at 14 cents a pound. This is, so far, the best sale reported in this section.

C. O. Portwood is here from Arlington to get settled down in Condon preparatory to taking charge of the clerk's office next Monday.

The entertainment and festival given by the ladies of the Saint's church last week was very successful. Between \$25 and \$30 was cleared.

Meetings are being held at the Saint's church by Elders Allen and Goodwin. Mr. Allen is lately out from the east and is an able and polished speaker.

The Globe office turned out a Midsummer Clearance Sale catalogue for P. H. Stephenson during the week which contains some rare bargains in summer dress goods and ladies wear.

The weather has been cool and cloudy for the past week and the wheat crop is coming out in fine shape. The indications now are that Gilliam county will harvest the largest crop of wheat in her history.

John Morris and L. B. Townsend are pushing the carpenter work on J. J. Portwood's residence right along. It is a common two-story structure and when completed will be one of the best dwellings in town.

Work on the new flouring mill is progressing satisfactorily. Some delay is being caused by the failure of the flooring to arrive but it is hoped that will soon be obviated. The company expects to be ready to run by about August 15th.

J. W. Jackson & Co. will continue to operate their stage line after July 1st handling passenger and express traffic exclusively. Messrs. Jackson have sustained an excellent service in the past and will no doubt continue to do so in the future. See their ad in another column.

Miss Minerva M. Neel has been engaged as the fifth teacher of Fossil public school, in place of Miss Hershner, who failed to complete her contract with the board. Miss Neel comes highly recommended from Condon, where she taught in the public school last year.—Fossil Journal.

All of the new county officials will take charge of their respective offices next Monday morning except Assessor-elect Shelton who will not take charge of his office until July 1st. The change will be a complete one except in the cases of Commissioner Dyer and Treasurer Stephenson who were re-elected.

The International Sunshine Society, of Condon, sends in a supplementary report which states that the Society has settled the hospital bill and funeral expenses of the Overlander baby amounting to \$32.20. There still remains in the treasury \$11.52 of the fund raised at the entertainment, given by the society, which will be devoted to other sunshine work.

A letter from Gilliam county to the writer on Monday says there is a very good prospect for a large crop of wheat in the Mayville country. Twenty years ago we remember Mayville flat, an unbroken plain of waving bunchgrass. It is all fenced up today, and is as fine a body of wheat land as can be found the world over, sadly in need of a railroad.—Moro Bulletin.

W. L. Barker was in town a day or two last week on business. Mr. Barker is quite enthusiastic over the fine prospects for a big wheat crop. He says his Shuttler Flat ranch gives promise of giving by far the heaviest yield it has ever given. Mr. Barker expects to build a fine modern residence in Condon this summer and bring his family here to make their permanent home this fall. Mr. Barker and his estimable family are numbered among Gilliam county's best citizens and will make a welcome addition to our growing city.

A fine shower fell here Tuesday night. Dr. Wood returned from Portland Monday much improved in health.

Miss Myrtle Fitzwater will be continued as deputy in the clerk's office after C. O. Portwood takes charge next Monday. Miss Fitzwater has been deputy under Mr. Frazer for two or three years and is most efficient and obliging in that capacity. Mr. Portwood could have made no better selection.

**New Enterprises.**

The Eastern Oregon Banking Co., through their cashier, F. T. Harburt, has bought a lot on Main street, from J. E. Lancaster upon which we understand they will soon erect a building in which to open a bank.

Mr. Harburt, at the same time also made a deal for a block of ground for the Arlington Lumber Co. upon which that company expects to open a lumber business.

Condon is rapidly coming to the front and we predict that, before snow flies, there will be some big changes in this busy burg.

**Believes in Grand Old Gilliam.**

L. O. Ralston, the well known capitalist of Portland was here Monday attending the delinquent tax sale. He secured about \$800 worth of property. Mr. Ralston is heavily interested in real estate in this county and loses no opportunity to increase his holdings. He believes the day is not far distant when Gilliam county wheat land will be worth \$30 per acre and he is not afraid to back his judgment by investments. While he owns an elegant home in Portland and lives there on account of the educational advantages for his children he says he prefers to live in Gilliam county rather than any place he knows of.

**A Chapter of Accidents.**

Ed Collins was seriously injured at his home in Ferry Canyon last Thursday by his team running away on a steep hill. Mr. Collins was thrown from the wagon and received a severe scalp wound and was also injured internally. He came to town and was having the hair trimmed from around the scalp wound, in the barber shop, when he fainted away. He complained of a severe pain in the region of the heart and had evidently received a heavy blow there in his fall.

Cecil, the young son of Herbert Halstead, fell from the porch at his home here Friday and sustained a fracture of his collar bone. The little fellow is getting along all right, however, and will soon be as good as new.

Tom Thorpe, the 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Thorpe, was enjoying a horseback ride at Frank Moore's place Sunday when the horse and rider parted company with the result of a broken arm for the boy. He came to town where Dr. Luna reduced the fracture and the boy is getting along all right.

**Trouble in the Mountains.**

Some disquieting rumors reached this city during the past week from the mountainous regions of Grant county where many thousands of sheep are driven every summer for summer range. The first rumor was brought in Thursday by Charlie Johnson, who has charge of Russell's sheep, and was to the effect that Blake Bros. band had been hit on in Dixie mountain and that 300 sheep were killed and one of the herders wounded.

Sunday a telephone message was received from Monument by S. B. Barker, which stated that one of his bands had also been attacked in the Dixie mountains and that 300 sheep and three pack horses were killed. The report also stated that the men in charge of the sheep returned the fire and wounded one of the attacking party. The band which is supposed to have been attacked is in charge of Charlie Ladiges, packer and Antone — herder. It is also reported that an invitation has been sent to sheep owners of this county to attend a conference at Canyon City on July 7, to try to arrange some plan by which clashes of this kind may be avoided. At this writing these reports lack confirmation.

Since the above was put in type we are informed that Mr. Barker has received a letter from Charlie Ladiges which stated that 18 or 20 sheep were killed and about the same number wounded. The letter made no mention of any man being shot, however, so that part of the former story was probably a canard.

**Demand for Normal Graduates.**

The State Normal School at Monmouth reports that the demand for its graduates during the past year has been much beyond the supply. Graduation from the Normal practically assures a place worth from \$40 to \$100 per month. The students take the State examination during the regular course and are easily able to pass on all subjects required for State papers before graduation. The school has a well equipped Training Department consisting of a Nine grade town school and a typical country school.

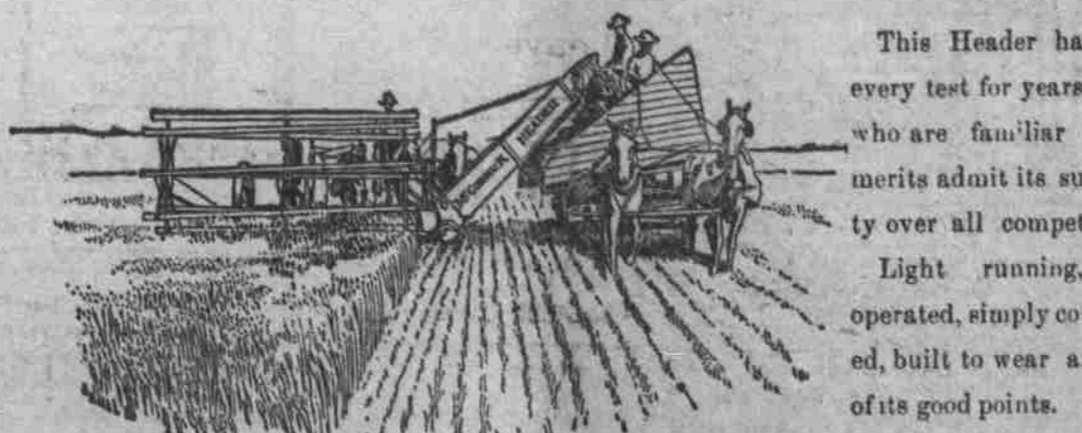
