THE COUNTRY EDITOR.

The troubles of a country editor are many, but he still lives; he still has an influence. He is still read, sometimes respected, but seldom honored by political office. He is before the public in a too powerful line light to be a successful suitor for votes. The country editor not only writes the editorials but the local happenings as well, for seldom can he depend on anyone else to do it with the nicety which is required. If a fellow townsman's boy gets into trouble he must speak of it or else the neighbors will accuse him of cowardice and thus his influence will be weakened. At the same time he must not offend the fond parent—for that means the loss of an advertisement or moral support—and the average country editor needs all the support he can get. He must hold up the county commissioners, or lose the county printing. He must not fail to mention the lawyer who won his case or the doctor who cured his patient. Every waking moment must be devoted to news getting—but it must be the kind of news that does not offend. The successful country editor is a diplomat. He must laugh with those who rejoice and weep with those who grieve. He must mention and elaborate upon the candy pull given by the poor as well as the swell reception given by the rich. He must print dodgers for the Methodist church as well as for the Episcopalian at a reduced price and give a free notice of the strawberry festival. The churches of a small community put their religion on a begging and alms taking basis. He must mention his rankest enemy, support the party nominees and look pleasant. He is expected to do more for nothing than any man in the community, and the man for whom he does the most will invariably say that he is only taking the paper because he wants to help the town along.

He is expected to trade cut his advertising space and his job work. But for all this he is, himself a great deal to blame. A self-respecting country editor can make the community respect him. He can compel the churches to pay him as they do the butcher, the grocer or the baker. He can make the politician take him into account and the merchant anxious to keep him in the community.—O. K. Stabbing Affray at The Dalles.
A special to the Portland Journal, from The Dalles, says: "Ben Scott, an employee of Wood Bros' meat market, of this city, is hovering between life and death at The Dalles hospital, the result of a stabbing affray that occurred at 3 o'clock Friday morning. Al Wilcox, of Graes Valley, a brother of Sheriff Wilcox, of Gilliam county, did the cutting. The knife entered the left side just below the heart inflicting a wound about 2 1/2 inches in length and severing two ribs. The particulars of the stabbing are unknown at this hour. Wilcox was arrested and placed in jail but was subsequently released on \$500 bail. Scott is about 20 years of age and Wilcox is 24. Both are prominent young men in their respective communities."
