New Business Ventures.

That Condon is growing, and that rapidly, is evidenced by the following list of new business ventures that have developed during the past week: Glen, Earhart and C. E. Bannons have bought lots on Main street, just north of Springton & Rogers' big livery barn, upon which they will erect a building 30x80 feet in which to open a furniture and undertaking establishment. They expect to commence building as soon as material can be procured and say they will have a large stock on hand in time for the Fall trade.

C. J. Conroy has secured a lease on a room in the Armory hall building in which he expects to open a saddlery and harness shop. We understand his stock is already ordered. Mr. Conroy is said to be an expert workman and will no doubt do well in his new venture. W. A. Darling is understood to be associated with Mr. Conroy in the enterprise.

Wm. Edden and John Harrison have purchased the meat market department of Elgin Myers' establishment and will conduct that part of the business in the future. We understand the new firm will shortly erect a new building for their own use. Mr. Myers will continue to conduct his confectionery business as before.

E. T. Hollenbeck has leased the room now occupied by the Condon Pharmacy and as soon as that firm moves into its elegant new quarters, across the street, he expects to open a tin and plumbing shop. This enterprise will fill a long felt want in Condon and should prove to be a paying business.

Henry E. Coendet has purchased the right of a new washing machine for this and Sherman counties and will at once begin an active canvass of the two counties. Mr. Coendet is a rattle and will no doubt find a lucrative business.

Home Again.

Jim Dunn returned to Condon Monday after an absence of a year and a half spent in Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado for the benefit of his health. Mr. Dunn seems glad to get back to Condon again and thinks the climate here is as healthful as anywhere. He says Colorado is a fine state, especially the southwest portion in the vicinity of Durango which is in the midst of a flourishing and stock country.

Status of Schools

School Superintendent Neal has completed his annual report for the year ending June 30 from which we glean the following: There are 1188 children, of school age in the county—589 boys and 599 girls. Forty-two teachers were employed during the year of which 14 were males and 28 were females. There are 36 organized districts in the county of which 34 make reports to the county superintendent as required by law. There are 33 school houses in the county, three of which were built during the year.

The superintendent visited 27 schools during the year which is the greatest number of official visits yet recorded. The total amount of money received during the year was \$2,307.73, more than double the amount received last year. The total disbursements was \$1895.76.

The report closes with the statement that there seems to be a lack of interest in school matters among parents, officers and teachers and the opinion is advanced that the absolute lack of interest in the county institute on the part of many teachers themselves has much to do with the apathy of officers and patrons. In making his entire round official visits the superintendent did not meet a single school officer or patron in the schools. The report also states that there are but few good school buildings in the county.

A Serious Cut.

Edgar Moore met with a serious accident Sunday as a result of which he will probably be laid up for some time. He was opening a package of goods in the cellar back of Barker's store, using a sharp pointed pen knife for the purpose, when the door blew shut striking his hand and driving the point of the knife into his left wrist. The radial artery was split and he lost considerable blood before he could reach a doctor. The flow of blood was soon checked but toward evening it broke out again and bled freely for a short time until it was again checked. At this writing he is getting along all right.

The Ball Game.

A warm ball game was played on the Condon diamond Sunday between the Olex and Mayville teams. The prize was a \$25 purse which was hung up by Condon to make the game interesting. Nine innings were played and at the finish the score stood 5 to 14 in Mayville's favor. One player of each team carried home a dislocated finger as a memento of the occasion.
