Mr. Smith spoke very highly of the new plant and seems to think there is plenty of room for all in this big, busy, bustling booming country. Reiling.
John Reiling, a brother of M. J. Reiling and a nephew of Andrew and Paul Griener, of Mayville, died at the St. Vincent hospital at Portland on the 19th inst. of blood poison which followed a surgical operation. Deceased was well known in this section having spent some time here at different times during the past two years. He was a member of the Second Oregon regiment and saw duty in the Philippines. He was 28 years old.

The funeral was held at his old home near Hillsboro in Washington county.

Back From the Interior.
Will Burns returned Tuesday from a trip through the interior which he made with a drummer. He says he saw much fine country but none that he liked better than Gilliam county and no towns that were "in it" with Condon. While in Heppner Monday Mr. Burns saw a sheep herder who had been brought in from the mountains with a serious bullet wound in his side a result of the range war. Mr. Cochran is said to be one of a party who were in a shooting scrape in the mountains last fall.

Obituary.
Again the trumpet call has sounded and another familiar figure among the pioneers of Gilliam county has struck his last camp on this side of the Great Divide and has crossed over to that undiscovered country from whence no traveler returns.

D. F. Stricklin is no more. His spirit took its flight on Sunday, August 17th, and his home thrice stricken within a few months by the hand of death, is again draped in the sable garb of mourning.

Deceased was born in Iowa, August 3, 1838 and was 64 years and 14 days old at the time of his death. He came to Oregon in 1850, when but a boy, and settled in Tigh Valley. He settled on Rock Creek, in this county, 30 years ago and has been a continuous resident of the county since that time.

In 1857 he married Martha Ann Waldrip by whom he had seven children. She died in 1884 and of her children all but one son, Charles Stricklin, have also been laid to rest.

In 1885 he married Mrs. Eva Miller and by her had four children. Two of them are dead, the youngest son, aged five years, having preceded his father to the better world by only two weeks. His son, Harry, a young man of much promise and excellent qualities, died six months ago and from the grief occasioned by his death the father never recovered. Mr. Stricklin was an excellent citizen, a good neighbor and an indulgent parent. He was universally respected and his going will leave another gap in the rapidly declining ranks of our pioneers.

The funeral took place at the Arlington cemetery on Tuesday.
