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# UNREASONABLE MINEOWNERS.

Portland Telegram.

Bishop Potter, on his arrival yesterday at New York from London, expressed surprise that the anthracite miners' strike has not yet been settled, and he is reported as saying:

"The anthracite coal operators have all along maintained a false position. They take the stand that they will not deal with the organizations, but insist on dealing with the men as individuals. Now this is all wrong. Any body of men whose interests are common have the right to organize into an association for mutual protection and are entitled to recognition as an organization in matters which affect their individual and combined interests."

Bishop Potter's sympathies might naturally be supposed to run in the direction of wealth and in favor of the men who possess great wealth and combine it for business purposes, but he perceives and declares that in refusing to recognize and treat with the unions the mine operators are doing wrong, and taking a position that cannot be approved or defended.

The Atlanta News voices the prevailing sentiment of the American people in this matter when it says: "In the beginning of the present great tie-up in the anthracite fields the affair wore only a commercial aspect, and wearing such, it held no interest for the Nation at large beyond that attached to the possibility of a higher price for fuel, or that aroused by sympathy with one side or the other.

"When, however, the owners and operators of the mines declined to arbitrate the demands of the miners, things took on a different look. For the refusal, in its last analysis, was nothing more or less than the refusal of the old Northumberland Earl to let his yeomanry lay their complaints before him, and held exactly the same significance.

"The issue between liberty and penance still hangs in the balance, and may not be settled for many days. And in the meantime still another phase has developed from the situation—the suffering of an innocent and unconcerned third party. That a handful of powerful men should be permitted to inflict grave inconvenience, to say the least, upon the sovereign people, without a protest, is a strange travesty, when Justice stands with poised scale, ready and anxious to serve all parties.

"Of what good is civilization if those who wish may ignore its institutions, and what is the next step we may expect on the part of the powerful few if the present attempted step by them is successfully taken?"
