Making Flour.

The big new plant of the Condon Milling Co. is at last completed and commenced Monday to manufacture a high grade of flour. Although the feed mill had been in operation for some time the entire plant was not connected up with the big engine until Saturday afternoon when a preliminary run was made to see, if all of the multitude of rolls and bolts and machines and conveyors and elevators and shafts and pulleys and belts and bands and fans and spouts and other things and devices that we have not room to enumerate and would not know the name of if we had, were properly adjusted and in place. Everything started off without a hitch, so nicely had every part been adjusted, showing the thorough and workmanlike manner in which every detail of the work of construction had been accomplished.

No labor or expense was spared by the owners to make the plant thoroughly modern and up-to-date and every part of the mill, from the big boiler in which the steam is generated to the packing machine which fills the sacks with finest flour, is the very best that could be procured.

The mill is fully equipped to turn out all the different grades of flour although we understand that, for the present, they expect only to make a straight grade; however as the country develops and trade increases no alterations will be necessary to be able to turn out any grade of flour for which there may be a demand.

Messrs Holten and Marquandson, whose energy and progressiveness has brought this new industry into being, are of the type of citizens calculated to build up a town. Condon needs many such.
