The Strike Situation.

President Roosevelt has sent a letter to President Mitchell requesting him to induce the miners to return to work at once coupled with the promise that he will immediately appoint a commission to investigate the issues involved in the present strike and pledging himself to do all he can to obtain a settlement in accordance with the report of such Commission.

Mr. Mitchell has not yet sent a reply to the president's letter but it is understood that he is unfavorable to such a method of settlement. He has referred the matter to the miners to be voted upon and so far all locals which have met and voted have been against the proposition. The entire National Guard of Pennsylvania has been called out to guard non-union workmen.

Portland trade unionists have undertaken to raise \$10,000 for the strike fund.
