OPINION CHANGES.

A somewhat startling effect of the coal strike is the rapid and radical change in public sentiment, as reflected by the metropolitan newspapers, on the question of the public ownership of public utilities.

The same newspapers which, only a few weeks ago, were vehement in their denunciation of all such "crazy schemes of impracticable, visionary socialists," even if they did not go so far as to denounce them as the "dangerous doctrines of demagogical anarchists," have, under the pressure of circumstances and the demands of a suffering public, come to look upon the government ownership of the anthracite coal mines as not only a very necessary but a most desirable and commendable thing.

The unwarranted and unbearable attitude of the coal magnates toward the miners and the public, within the last two weeks, is the real cause of this radical change in the public temper and, should the exigencies of the situation, and the pressing necessities of the people, force the government to this radical—almost revolutionary—step, the coal barons will have only themselves to thank for their predicament.

Many people have habitually opposed the idea of public ownership and upheld the private ownership and exploitation of public utilities, on the old bourgeois theory that "what is right," but the rapid whirl of events in these go-ahead 20th. century days is rapidly awakening all classes and conditions of men to a realization of the fact that, perhaps after all, the climax of perfection in the science of government and economics has not yet been fully attained.

The arrogant bearing of the coal operators indicates that they believe their position to be so strong that they can ride rough-shod over the rights of the miners and the public and even defy and insult the president of the United States. In effect they said at the White House conference and are still saying: "We own the coal; we control the situation; we have money enough and benches enough to control the different legislative bodies, wherever and whenever necessary to subvert our interests, and we may have a string on the courts. We are the masters; and what are you going to do about it? Come to your master's terms, ye vassals, all of you, from President Roosevelt down to the humblest toiler in the mines, or freeze and die at our hands when Boreas blows his bitter blasts."

The trend of events today indicates what the people are going to try to do about it and it remains to be seen which force—the 75,000,000 people of America or the five presidents of the coal carrying railroads

—is the stronger. Things have been happening pretty fast lately and they promise to continue to happen at such a rate, in the immediate future, as to make true, in one sense at least, the oft-quoted contention of the old darkey preacher that "The world do move."
