Robbery at Clem.

Wealth in Oil and Gas.

Ross Beardsley, one of the directors of the Columbia River Development Co., was in town a day or two this week in the interest of that organization. Mr. Beardsley is enthusiastic over the discovery and present development of the oil and gas field on the Columbia river, near Castle Rock, 16 miles above Arlington, in which his company is interested.

The discovery of gas was made a year ago last January by Mr. Beardsley and W. H. Colwell while hunting in that vicinity and after some preliminary investigation to assure themselves that the discovery was really natural illuminating gas, they proceeded with the organization of a company to take up the work of active development of the field.

The company is incorporated under the laws of Oregon with a capital stock of \$500,000 divided into 500,000 shares at \$1.00 each. The officers of the company are all well known business men, of Gilliam and Morrow counties, of unquestioned integrity, whose connection with the enterprise assures judicious management and square dealing with the stockholders. They are the following:

President—George Conser, of the First National Bank, of Heppner.

Secretary—Henry Crass, of Arlington.

Directors—Geo. Conser, Heppner; W. H. Herrin, Olex; Ross Beardsley, W. H. Colwell, A. H. Ruedy, Arlington.

The company controls over 8000 acres of land in the new oil field and already considerable development work has been accomplished.

At one place on Alder creek, on the Washington side, where the gas escapes through a crevice in the bed rock in the bottom of the creek, a tank, 4 feet in diameter, has been placed in the water over the crevice in which the gas collects in such quantity as to create a pressure capable of lifting nearly 1000 pounds weight. Another tank collects sufficient gas to furnish fuel for cooking purposes in the house where the company's workmen are boarded. Oil seepages are also found in the district and the indications of oil found while prosecuting the work already done are very promising.

Several oil experts have visited the district and, after making exhaustive examinations of the prospects, have declared this field as giving promise of being as good as any yet discovered.

The company has recently purchased a one-half interest in a large oil well drilling rig which is capable of going to a depth of 2500 feet and they propose to sink a well with it at once. It is the opinion of experts that oil and gas will both be found in paying quantities at a depth of 1000 to 1500 feet.

This discovery, once developed and placed on a producing basis will mean much to the Inland Empire as no other known industry will produce wealth so rapidly as an oil gusher.

A limited amount of stock has been placed on the market at the low price of 25 cents a share to secure funds for development and every dollar thus realized will be used for that purpose.
