CELILLO NEXT.

Portland is jubilant—and so, for that matter, is all of Oregon—over the fact that Secretary Root has ordered the transport Grant fitted up, with all possible dispatch, as an ocean dredger and put to work deepening the channel at the mouth of the Columbia. This is good news, indeed, and is doubly gratifying to Eastern Oregon because the fact that the federal authorities will soon begin active work on the bar will give the up-to-date, public spirited, progressive people of Portland an opportunity to devote more time to aiding the people of the Inland Empire in urging the importance of opening the river to navigation at Celilo. A 40-foot channel at the bar will be capable of accommodating a mighty commerce and to furnish the tonnage necessary to load the fleets which the deep channel will invite and admit to Portland's port makes absolutely necessary the early opening of the river and the speedy development of the latent resources of this great country that lies east of the Cascade range. This country cannot be properly developed without an open river, and now that the bar is to be attended to Celilo must be next. And Portland will have plenty opportunity to help and will, of course.

COAL STRIKE ENDED.

The coal strike is over. The miners, led by their splendid chief, have won the principal point involved in the bitter struggle. The other has proven that a man born to toil, reared in the mines, possessing none of the advantages of wealth, position or training—save that which he has acquired in the school of experience
