Strike is Over.

The striking coal miners on Tuesday voted to accept the arbitration commission appointed by the president and declared the strike off. Work will be resumed this morning.

Another Rail Road Survey.

A party of surveyors are again in the field surveying on the line of the proposed Condon-Arlington railway. The party is in charge of Surveyor Mohr, who ran the line of one year ago. The party came out from Arlington Thursday evening and commenced work at the French Charlie place and are now running a line up the creek via Olex. It is believed a better grade can be secured by that route than by the one surveyed last year and will also have the advantage of giving Olex a road and securing much wheat tonnage that would otherwise go to the Heppner branch.

The Gions has the information from what appears to be good authority that Messrs Elrod and Moore and their associates, who made the survey and secured some right-of-way last year, have disposed of their interests to W. C. Moens, W. A. Forsch and F. E. Elmendorf, of Spokane, who are having the present work done and who will doubtless do their best to build and equip the much needed road.

No one connected with the project will discuss their plans or give out any information and the succeeding moves will be watched with some interest.

Interested in Condon.

Mr. F. T. Hurlbert, cashier of the Arlington National Bank, of Arlington, and the Eastern Oregon Banking Co., of Shaniko, was here Saturday looking over the town with a view to establishing a bank in Condon. While here Mr. Hurlbert interviewed a number of the leading business men in regard to taking a limited amount of stock in the institution so that the board of directors may be all home people. Mr. Hurlbert stated to a representative of this paper that it is not a question of getting the stock taken, as already more than enough has been spoken for on the outside to furnish all of the capital required. He believes, however, that it is better to have the board of directors composed of local business men and for that reason offered a limited amount of stock to them.

Mr. Hurlbert authorized us to make the statement that the bank is an assured fact although it is likely that work on the building will not be commenced until Spring on account of the difficulty in getting building material at this season.

We understand that the bank building will be a substantial two story structure of either stone or brick. A lot has been secured on Main street on the corner north of the Condon Furniture and Hardware Co's. store. The Condon Bank, when established, will, we understand, be made the principal one of the chain of banks with which Mr. Hurlbert is connected and it is probable he will make Condon his home and take personal charge of the management as soon as it is ready for business.

While here Mr. Hurlbert also closed a deal with J. E. Lancaster by which he acquired a one-half interest in the Condon townsite. The price named in the article of agreement is \$2500.00. Mr. Hurlbert's lively interest in Condon is pretty good evidence that he has an abiding faith in the town's future.
