He could with as great a degree of consistency say that all notices coming from the probate court should be published in the Times-Mountaineer, it being the only democratic paper in the county, as the register of the land office can say that all land notices shall be published in the republican papers of the district. This however, would be considered awfully "partisan."-Times-Mountaineer.

In one case at least, the land office business was taken from a paper of recognized circulation and given to an upstart sheet that had no circulation, as required by the postal authorities, for purely partisan reasons, even after the paper of recognized circulation advertised its willingness to publish such notices at one-third the rate charged by the upstart sheet.
