Mr. Mariner Speaks.

Blalock, Oregon, Nov. 17, '02. Editor Condon Globe:— There is something evidently wrong with the semi-annual reports as published for this year. The present county officials as well as those belonging to the "ex" list would no doubt gladly assist in correcting errors and give such explanations as would result in presenting the financial status of Gilliam county both past and present correctly to the public, in case their attention was called to this matter. The March 31st summary gives the net estimated debt above resources as \$8,230.12. That of September 30 as \$1,155.17. Evidently something wrong here for the fall report in any given year should always show a greater indebtedness than that of the preceding spring. This is plain when we consider that on the debit side there are six months' expenditures to be added, while on the other side the incoming resources consist only of fees paid in and incidentals there being nothing to add in the way of taxes as taxes are accounted for in the preceding March summary. The September report shows an incomplete report from the sheriff's office, that report giving \$2,635.20 as amount of taxes collected while the treasurer reports having received \$30,918.53 from the sheriff. Perhaps sheriff Johnson only reported what he collected, but this is not clear. It will be noticed that the treasurer reports having \$23,931.50 in the general fund and also that this whole was entered in the September summary as "applicable to the payment of county warrants" evidently a mistake as there is always money on hand belonging to the school and other funds. In March last the amount of the general fund was \$10,025.57 but only \$5,331.00 was applicable to the payment of county warrants. The above was not written for the purpose of finding fault, but with a view to having the financial status of our county published correctly. W. J. MARINER.
