NEED OF STREET LIGHTS.

The recent dark, rainy, muddy nights have served to emphasize the need of some system of street lights for Condon. The town is growing rapidly and is fast becoming a place of considerable importance and public improvements of this kind are necessities where a few years ago they could be dispensed with.

The city council should take this matter up at once and take steps to light the town and make the way of the night traveler a little less strenuous.

Arlington has lately put up a half dozen such lights which add much to the appearance of the town and to the comfort of the people. No doubt our city fathers could secure any desired information from the Arlington officials in regard to the cost etc. Condon needs street lamps and should have them. Citizens, talk it up.

GROWTH OF SOCIALISM.

There is a decided movement among those who think upon current problems, and a few of these are law makers, in favor of a Federal inheritance-tax law. One was in force for a while as a special revenue measure, consequent upon the Spanish War, but along with other revenue taxes was repealed. There was no really good reason for the repeal of the revenue law, or this part of it, rather than the repeal of the tariff law, but it was aimed at the rich people, or those who expected to be heirs of rich people, and so it had to go. The inheritance-tax law may not be re-enacted as a Federal statute, but it should be the law of every state. The idea of it is right, the principle is just; the man who under our laws and opportunities becomes rich ought to be obliged to leave a percentage of his wealth to the state wherein he enjoyed those laws and opportunities. This may be a species of "socialism," too; but we are coming to socialism, of one sort or another, sure enough; and we had better appropriate its best features before its worst overwhelm us.

The large vote cast by the Socialist party in the late elections should be a "pointer" and a warning. The Republican party was endorsed, as President Roosevelt said, merely to see if it would "make good"—and also because the Democratic party is both disrupted and disreputable. But millions of men who voted for Republican candidates are not over in love with that party either. And many thousands silently voted the Socialist ticket. In Ohio the Socialist candidate for Secretary of State received over 14,000 votes; in Massachusetts the Socialist candidate for Governor received 33,000 votes—and votes in other states were almost equally significant. This Socialist vote is likely to grow into great proportions, if not into a majority, within a few years. Mr. Chase, the Socialist candidate for Governor of Massachusetts in explanation of the vote he received, said:

"Industrial development has reached that stage where the people of the Nation are completely in the power of a few gigantic combinations, whose power comes to them by the virtue of the ownership of industry. The 33,000 votes I secured came largely from the ranks of organized labor as a distinct demand for the abolition of the present system of industrial servitude. Both the Democratic and Republican parties stand for capitalism with its high prices, low wages, lack of employment and strikes for living wages; its syndicates, corporations and trusts, which control our industrial life. I stood for the collective ownership of the trusts and all other industry and for organized industry scientifically conducted and democratically operated. Massachusetts has spoken, in tones that the Nation must heed, for the social revolution. Thirty-three thousand
