UNRELIABLE.

If the rest of the matter contained in the 50-page Christmas number of the Portland Telegram is no more reliable than that devoted to Gilliam county it is not worth much as a source of reliable information concerning the state. Here is the "write up" grand old Gilliam gets:

"The surface of Gilliam county is rolling, with but little timber. Several streams in the county furnish water for the numerous herds of cattle, sheep and horses, besides an abundant supply for irrigation. The principal business of the citizens is stockraising. The soil is fertile, and produces cereals and vegetables in abundance. Any fruits that will grow in a temperate region may be found here. Arlington, the county seat, is on the O.R. & N., and does a big business in shipping wool. The population is made up of an exceptionally industrious class of people."
