Representative Thomas H. Tongue of the First Oregon District died at Washington D. C., Sunday of heart failure. His death was wholly unexpected and came as a severe shock to his many friends.

Deceased was born in Lincolnshire, England in 1844; came to Oregon in 1859; graduated from Pacific University, 1893; entered politics in 1898 as member of the State senate. He has served six years in Congress. He was largely interested in farming and took particular interest in breeding blooded horses. His remains will be brought to his old home at Hillsboro, Oregon, for interment.

WILL BUILD COURT-HOUSE.

County Court Orders Building Constructed.

CONDON GIVES \$1,000.00.

Building to be Completed During the Present Year.

Gilliam county is to have a courthouse. No longer will the county stand at the extreme foot of the class among all the counties of Oregon in the matter of a modern building in which to transact county business and a safe place to keep valuable public records.

During the recent term of the county court it became known that the court would consider favorably a proposition to build a courthouse if the people of Condon would donate \$1,000.00 to that purpose. Within an hour after it was known that the court was disposed to impose this condition on the proposition the city officials promptly drew a warrant for \$500.00 and a subscription paper which was circulated speedily made up the other \$500.00. The bonus was offered on the condition that the building must cost not less than \$10,000.00.

A delegation of citizens waited on the court and presented the offer of the city and at the same time presented a number of affidavits signed by leading citizens and heavy taxpayers stating that the affidavits were absent from the county at the time of the last state election and that, had they been here, they would have voted "yes" on the proposition of building a court house. The number of these affidavits was considerably in excess of the slight majority which was returned against the court house at the June election.

The proposition was then considered by the court and was duly accepted the vote standing:

Yes—Dunn, Froman,
No—Dyer.

It is generally understood that Commissioner Dyer realized the great need for a county building and a safe depository for the records and is not very strongly opposed to the erection of a building at this time. He, however, had given a pledge before election that he would abide by the popular vote on the question and felt that any other action on his part would be a violation of that pledge.

The order of the court calls for the construction of the building during the present year. It is the intention to advertise for bids soon so that a contract can be let at the next term of court in March.

Some Good Shooting.

The shooting match Saturday was attended by a large and enthusiastic crowd of sportsmen. Olex was ably represented by Messrs. Wade and McPhearson and B. K. Searcy held up the colors for Beecher Flat.
There was all kinds of things to shoot at including live pigeons, clay pigeons, the earth, the air and the sky. There was no casualties except among the pigeons although there was a close call or two as the result of accidents. No one was shot, however, although some were said to be half shot.

E. J. Moore took first prize in the live pigeon shoot and in the rifle target shoot B. K. Searcy took first prize, A. J. Hawes second, Harvey Blake third, and Will Stevens fourth. Sherman Wade of Olex, and his partner Mr. McPhearson, gave a fine exhibition of trap shooting. Wade broke ten clay pigeons straight and McPhearson broke nine out of ten double shooting.

The tie between McPhearson Searcy, and Al Searcy was decided by a single bird each, McPhearson winning second money.
