GOOD LEGISLATION.

No act of the Oregon legislature for many years has been of greater importance or will result in more general benefit than the appropriation of \$165,000 for the construction of a portage road between The Dalles and Celilo. It is indeed a vast amount of money to expend upon a single improvement, but it is an expenditure that will bear results. It is the one move that will unhook the highway which nature has provided for carrying the products of the great Inland Empire to the markets of the world. For when a portage road is in operation the influence that has been used against the construction of canal and locks will be removed. No longer will it be of benefit to the railroads to maintain lobbies in Washington to prevent the national government taking hold of the improvement. Following the action of the state of Oregon in determining to act for itself and relieve the people from the monopoly that has for years collected exorbitant tributes from them, we may expect congress to favorably consider the improvement of the Columbia river and pass a liberal appropriation therefor. The thanks of all Eastern Oregon are due to the present legislature for this one act of justice.—Times-Mountaineer.

JIM HILL BLAMES LABOR.

"As the labor unions killed industrial England, so will they bring grave financial reverses here. The country is fast approaching that crisis. It may come in a year."

This is the thrust that the most conscienceless capitalist of the age directs against the laboring men of the United States.

A believer in the union of capital, he denies the workingman a like privilege. A manipulator of the most arbitrary trust that seeks to throttle the freedom of traffic and the open channels of trade, he lays the sins of his own spawn at the door of labor.

In hopes that some prejudiced members of society will believe what he says, he places the blame of the impending crisis upon the workingmen, instead of placing it where it rightfully belongs upon the shoulders of those human vampires who are forcing the small capitalists out of business, cornering the supply of the necessities of life, the means of transportation and the money of the world in preparation for a crash.

James J. Hill is no fool. He knows that the trusts and their baneful influence in the business circles of the country are hurrying a panic and he is artful enough, dishonest enough in expressing an opinion to charge the inexorable crash upon innocent men in hopes that he may direct the people's wrath away from the real culprits. It has only been a month since Hill made a statement that over-production of manufacturers would cause the panic.

With him the panic is a settled fact. But he shifts from one cause to another.

He finds public sentiment so bitterly arrayed against the combines of which he is chief, that he fears to aggravate the masses further by allusions to capitalistic easefulness so he turns his blighting venom upon labor thinking to divert the attention from the real source of wrong. The great combines are making their last stand. The active sentiment of all classes of people is against them. Hill's empty accusation does not blind a single person to the truth.

If a panic comes it will be through the machinations of the trusts. It will be invited by the organic rottenness of the law that permits them to gather the utilities of the nation into pools for private gain.

As the tilted lords and privileged few of England exploited her priceless industries and resources and brought ruin upon the most energetic people of Europe, so will the privileged few of this country who are entrenched behind evil laws, reduce it to England's level.

Capital, and not labor, holds the key to panics.—East Oregonian.

Want Administrator Removed.

Suit has been brought in the superior court of this county to have Chas Storrs furniture dealer, of Olympia removed from the position as administrator of the estate of Alfred Dunlap, who died at his home at Tumwater, October 21, 1902. The Dunlap estate is estimated to be worth anywhere from \$5,000 to \$10,000, and behind the suit which has just sprung up is an interesting story.

Charles Storrs secured the position he holds as administrator by virtue of the fact that he is the step father of the 9-year-old son of the late Hugh Dunlap, a second cousin of Alfred Dunlap whose estate is in question. Shortly after the death of the latter Storrs applied for papers as administrator, representing it is alleged, that his step-son was the only living heir to the estate.

This week other heirs appeared on the scene and began suit for what they claim is their rightful interest in the property. S. L. Dunlap, of Freeewater, Oregon, visited Olympia personally and took the matter up with an attorney, and late yesterday afternoon filed the papers in the pending suit, a hearing upon which will be held before Judge Linn at 10 a. m. tomorrow.

Besides S. L. Dunlap the heirs joining in the petition which has been filed in the superior court include William Dunlap, of Condon, Oregon; George Dunlap, of Halsey, Oregon; Thos. Dunlap, of Oak Park, Cal., and Mrs. J. B. Baird, of Walla Walla, whose maiden name was Emma Dunlap. These heirs claim to be brothers and sister of the late Hugh Dunlap and second cousins of the late Alfred Dunlap, their father being a full cousin of the latter. Phil Skillman has been retained as attorney for the petitioners and will appear when the case comes up tomorrow—Olympia Record.

Wm. Dunlap will probably go to Olympia to look after his interest in the estate.
