Congressman Moody, whose term of office expired yesterday, is on very friendly terms with President Roosevelt, as is witnessed by the new appointments for the Land Office at The Dalles which were announced Friday. Mr. Moody, on the eve of his retirement from the House of Representatives secured the appointment of Mr. M. T. Nolan as register and Miss Annie Lang as receiver of the Land Office in his home town and the hopes of Messrs. Lucas and Patterson for reappointment to the comfortable positions are gone glimmering. The appointments came as a surprise to many as it was supposed that Mr. Moody was "downed" by his defeat in the congressional convention last Spring but this seems to be a mistake. Mr. Nolan is a well known citizen of The Dalles and Miss Lang has for several years been a clerk in the Land Office and the ability and fitness of both for these important positions is unquestioned. It is reported from Washington that President Roosevelt offered Mr. Moody any federal appointment which he might select but that gentleman declined the offer preferring to return to The Dalles and engage in business. He made his wishes known in regard to the Land Office however and it must be said that his wishes were fairly entitled to the consideration which the president gave them.

Obituary.

Mrs. Minnie Clark Moore, wife of S. V. Moore, and daughter of J. E. Clark, of Hood River, died at her home in Ferry Canyon, of bronchial pneumonia, on Friday morning, February 27, 1903, aged 25 years.

She had been a sufferer from pulmonary trouble for more than a year and several weeks ago went to Hood River to visit her father. While there a marked improvement in her condition was noticed and when she returned to Condon less than a week before her death she seemed to be much better. A heavy cold, contracted on the trip home, developed into pneumonia, however, and death resulted as above stated.

Deceased was born in Clay county, Kansas, March 9, 1878, and when yet a child came to Oregon with her parents the family settling at Condon her home having been in this vicinity ever since. She was married March 9, 1898, and leaves one child, a little son 2 1/2 years old, besides her husband, father, four sisters and three brothers to mourn her untimely death. She was a consistent member of the Latter Day Saint's church of this city, and was known and loved by a large circle of friends in this county.

The funeral services were held in the Saint's church Sunday afternoon being conducted by Elder A. B. Moore and the number of friends and neighbors present testified of the high esteem in which deceased was held. The funeral discourse was the largest which ever entered Mount Moriah cemetery.

Some Facts About State Taxes.

In the issue of the Arling-ton Record of February 27 appears a petition to the County Court of Gilliam county, Oregon, praying for the postponement of the construction of a court house at Condon until 1905, and in support of such petition sets out what purports to be a statement of facts which are misleading, pernicious and false, and it occurs to the writer hereof that in fairness to the County Board in the matter some fair and true statement of the case should be presented to the taxpayers, and that the method of apportioning state taxes should receive first consideration in this article.

See 3091, Bellinger & Cotton's annotated Codes and Statutes after stating the manner of ascertaining the amount of state tax for the ensuing year provides as follows: (See 3001, paragraph 4, page 1053 2nd Vol.)

"In order to ascertain the proportion of such taxes to be paid by the several counties, the assessor shall ascertain from the reports of the assessor of each county the amount of the state taxes to be paid by the several counties for the past five years to wit: Under this appropriation Gilliam county's proportion is 0.087 per cent. This act was passed by the legislature in 1901, repealing the act of 1899 requiring county clerks to transmit to the secretary of state a certified transcript of county assessment rolls, from which transcript of assessment rolls, and taking the amount of assessable property shown thereby as a basis, the state board apportioned the taxes due from the several counties. The repeal of this act was brought about by the disreputable practice of the officials of certain counties (of which disreputable practice the records of Gilliam county seem to show that some officials thereof were not wholly exempt) of concealing the true amount of the assessable property by omitting the same from the assessment rolls and reaching it for county taxation by what is known as a sheriff's assessment.

The author of this pretended petition further says that the deferring of the construction of a court house would save in interest charges about \$2,000. He evidently assumes that the many thousands of acres of land that are monthly being granted to settlers are not to be assessed. That the enormous increase in all land values are not to be recognized. As a matter of fact the income of the county should without an increase in the levy in 1904 be double that of 1902.

This artistic wielder of the pen further assumes that Gilliam county's additional taxation for state purposes would amount to \$8,000. By what abortive process does he arrive at this conclusion? Does he attempt to convey the impression that Gilliam is the only county in the state now incurring additional expenditures? The truth is that almost every county in the state has greatly increased its annual expenditures since the present apportionment made in 1901. On our eastern boundary we find Morrow county constructing a court house at an expenditure of some \$50,000 while joining on the south is Wheeler county with recent construction of public buildings at an expenditure of \$12,000 or \$13,000 and we also find similar conditions existing on our west in Sherman county and such is the condition throughout almost the entire state. Instead of assuming that the construction of a court house would result in an additional state tax of \$8,000 had this self appointed "watch dog of the treasury" presented the matter in a fair and impartial manner he could have arrived at no other result than that even with the \$10,000 expenditure for a court house there can be no material increase in the rate of taxation of the individual taxpayer.

In answer to an editorial in the Record of the same date it might be well to add that the recent election failed utterly to record the sentiment of the people on the question of constructing a court house as out of 938 votes cast there were only 350 against the proposition so that even the resuscitated author of the pretended petition would be unable to so juggle figures that he could show a majority of voters as opposed thereto.

In conclusion we desire to say that we presume the author of the pretended petition [which by the way strangely resembles a widely circulated campaign article put out in the interest of a certain defeated candidate at the last election] is sincere in his endorsement of the county court's action in ordering the construction of a court house at Condon and therefore the act of the recent Legislature in extending the time for a re-apportionment of state taxes until the year 1910 removes his pretended objections as the time is thus extended further even than he suggests, when, as he says, this county's additional tax will be \$8,000. And even if this were true it cannot now, under the act of 1903, affect the taxpayer of Gilliam county until 1911.
