EDITOR GLOBE—
In your issue of March 5th appeared an article regarding a petition filed with the county court for their action at the recent March term thereof, asking the court to arrange any court house contract on time that would prevent any increase of the county's state taxes for the years 1905 to 1910. As a fair proposition I ask you to give space for some reply to what seems to be a personal attack made before the petition was considered by the court.
Before drafting this petition Mr. Dannebaum wrote me that he could not determine as to what action the legislature would take regarding the law approved March 27, 1901. Afterwards it transpired that the Pierce bill was passed extending the time for apportioning state taxes from 1905 to 1910, thus, at one stroke, accomplishing all that the petition, referred to above, called for. It would not be necessary to pursue this subject further if the "Member of County Court" had not questioned the good faith and accuracy of the one who drafted the petition.

The average state tax paid by Gilliam county of late has been \$7560 on a ratio basis of .0087. The secretary of state in his report of county expenditures for the year 1901 reports Gilliam's expenses as \$13030.12 and figures her ratio based on that amount of average expense to be .0124. This ratio as the law stood would have become effective in 1905. At that time if the state should raise the same amount of money as she did in 1901 and 1902 Gilliam's portion under the new ratio of .0124 (basing state taxes on expenditures instead of average valuations as now) would be \$10,735 on an expenditure basis of \$13030.12. It is clear that if this expenditure basis was raised to \$15030.12 as would be the case if \$10,000 was added to the expenses of a five year period that the increase in state tax to be paid would be 15 per cent amounting to \$1810 a year for the five years beginning with 1905. The action of the legislature puts off the payment of this additional estimated amount five years thus making it unnecessary to levy any tax for that purpose until 1910 thereby saving in interest at 6 per cent \$1419. In case the legislature had failed to amend the law in question it would have been within the power of the county court to have arranged court house expense matters in a shape that would have accomplished the same result. They might have found it necessary in order to do this to put off the building, say one and a half years, which, if done would have saved \$800 interest on the original investment at 6 per cent, which added to the \$1449 would more than make the saving of \$2000 interest estimated in the petition. As the matter now stands Gilliam will be liable to the state beginning with 1910 for additional state tax as a result of the added expense of putting up necessary public buildings. It is more than likely however that some future legislature will further amend the law and exempt the cost of public buildings since the counties of Morrow, Sherman, Wheeler, Gilliam and probably others will work to that end which is but fair seeing that most of the counties had their buildings already constructed before the passage of the Act of Feb. 27, 1901. In case anyone cares to look into this matter they will find all the data referred to on file in the clerk's office at Condon.
